# Chairman's Statement

Our key results for the year ended 31 December 2021 are as follow:

- Net profit attributable to shareholders at HK\$147.2 million
- Gearing ratio of non-current liabilities to shareholders' fund at 46%. Current ratio at 1.5
- Basic earnings per share landed at HK\$0.48
- Net asset value per share amounted to HK\$10.22
- Proposed final dividend per share is HK\$0.06 and the dividend for the year will be HK\$0.08

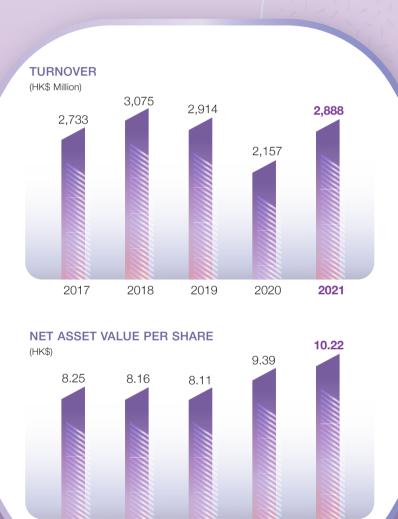

# Financial Highlights



## **BUSINESS REVIEW**

The coronavirus has continued to spread in 2021. However, with governments worldwide pushing forward compulsory Covid-19 vaccination, trade activities have been resumed in the second half of the year. There is also a growth in consumer spending on apparel products after the prolonged lockdown due to the pandemic. Mainland China was the first country to normalize after coronavirus, domestic sales volume has witnessed robust growth. In 2021, High Fashion had significant growth of revenue from manufacturing and trading of garments. High Fashion is optimistic that with our diversified product development, smart and green manufacturing and speed-to-market strategy, we are going to achieve a promising result in the coming years.

The pandemic has changed people's life and spending pattern. Businesses have adjusted to working from home; hence comfort and functionality have become top priorities in daily attire. E-commerce has registered strong growth and reshaped traditional supply chain models. With our core value of "being market-oriented" deeply ingrained, High Fashion has been able to adjust our market strategy with forward-looking mindset to answer to changing market needs.

Sustainability and green are the essence of our business. We have reformed our production process and improved efficiency to achieve waste and carbon footprint reduction. High Fashion has been pushing for breakthroughs in green product development, including advocating bio-based fabric, recycled fabric and upcycling and is working hand-in-hand with suppliers to reduce carbon emissions. We anticipate our effort on sustainability and innovation would bring synergy to the group and enhance our profitability. Together High Fashion is advancing to the world of green fashion with our clients.

Digitalization and our information technology infrastructure have enabled a comprehensive upgrade of our business operation and High Fashion is able to amplify our general operational and management efficiency in the everchanging business environment. Information technology has empowered our group to achieve real-time and seamless communication and has become a major driving force for High Fashion to strive for breakthroughs.

In 2021, High Fashion also started the construction of Phase II of our WL District in Hangzhou upon our solid property management foundation. This project has not only generated stable income for our group but also facilitated the creation of our supply chain platform, bringing a golden opportunity for High Fashion to upgrade and transform into a diversified business.



## FINANCIAL REVIEW

The Group's revenue in 2021 increased by 33.9% to HK\$2,888 million (2020: HK\$2,157 million). Revenue was mainly derived from the Manufacturing and Trading of Garment business, benefiting from the recovery of consumers' demand and a substantial increase in domestic orders in Mainland China. However, the rising raw material and higher fuel price resulting in a slightly decrease in gross profit margin. In response to the soaring cost of sales, we have adopted certain cost management measures and restructuring projects to reduce costs. With the operation flexibility, the Group keeps adjusting our business and operating environment. The Group's profit for the year of 2021 was HK\$147.6 million (2020: HK\$125.2 million).

Geographically, revenue derived from China in 2021 was HK\$1,557.5 million, accounting for 53.9% of total revenue, and it represented an increase of 44.9% (2020: HK\$1,075.1 million, representing 49.8% of total revenue). The Group's export sales to others, mainly to Southeast Asian countries, also increased, accounting for 15.8% of total revenue (2020: 13.3% of total revenue). Selling in the USA and European countries have not yet returned to pre-pandemic levels but have rebounded steadily, accounting for 30.3% of total revenue (2020: 36.9% of total revenue). This change reflects the Group is shifting and diversifying our development focus to different markets and regions in order to expand the sales network and reduce risks.

Other gains for the year of 2021 was HK\$140.1 million (2020: HK\$148.5 million), consisting of mainly fair value gains from investment properties of HK\$129.4 million (2020: HK\$150.5 million). The fair value gain from investment properties in both years' earnings attributed to the increased property prices in Hong Kong. 2020 is higher than that in 2021 due to the revitalization works of the Hong Kong properties was completed in mid-2020 and ready to lease out.

Administrative expenses as a percentage of total revenue decreased from 11.4% in 2020 to 9.7% in 2021. Selling and distribution expenses as a percentage of total revenue decreased from 6.6% in 2020 to 6.0% in 2021. The decreases were mainly due to the leveraging of the Group's expenses resulted from streamlined operating processes and increased revenue.

The Group recorded income tax expense of HK\$38.2 million (2020: HK\$36.5 million), which including deferred tax of HK\$23.7 million (2020: HK\$27.2 million) generated from fair value gains on investment properties.

For the year ended 2021, basic earnings per share were HK\$0.48, an increase of 17.1% compared to HK\$0.41 in 2020. As at 31 December 2021, net asset value per share was HK\$10.22, an increase of 8.8% compared to HK\$9.40 as at 31 December 2020.

# Manufacturing and trading of garments

Revenue from garment manufacturing and trading business in 2021 was HK\$2,743 million, an increase of HK\$829 million or 43.3%, compared to revenue of HK\$1,914 million in 2020. Profit for 2021 was HK\$29.4 million, representing a significant increase of 673.7% compared to HK\$3.8 million for 2020.

The Group incorporated largely sustainable elements in product development and production design, which is highly recognized by customers in China and overseas. Through lean management to reduce production costs, optimize workflows to improve operational profitability, and create a green fashion ecosystem with our supply chain, we provided the more innovative and comprehensive services to our customers.

Amid the swiftly markets change, the Group has adopted an active, rapid and flexible strategy to expand the markets in China and Southeast Asian, which enabling us to quickly fulfil the needs of existing and new customers after recovering from the epidemic.

# SEGMENT INFORMATION (Cont'd)

## Property investment and development

Income from property investment and development business was HK\$127 million in 2021, compared to HK\$210 million in 2020. The decrease in revenue was due to the sales of the Tonglu's residential units was completed in 2020.

The Group is now vigorously expanding the scale of WL District project. The WL District in Hangzhou has received recognition and support from the local government, we will continue to optimize the combination of enterprises stationed in the districts, and collaborate with more high-quality partners for the creation and innovative co-research projects. The first phase of WL District project under development in Hangzhou has been completed and will gradually reflect the return on investment in future.

The Group's high-quality property investment and development portfolio will continue to provide high-value assets and generate stable revenue for the Group.

### **Brand business**

The Group will continue to scale down the retail brand business. Sales from brand business was mainly attributed to internal orders and clearance of inventory.

# ENVIRONMENTAL, SOCIAL AND CORPORATE RESPONSIBILITY

Over the years, the Group has vigorously adopted the concept of sustainable development and green, from procurement, production processes, product research and development, centered on environmental and green enterprise. We committed to solve the problems of high energy consumption and pollution that are common in traditional manufacturing business. With the celebration of our traceable accomplishments of the four-year Sustainable Development Goals set Sewage treatment in 2016, the Group has set a fiveyear Sustainable Development Goals in 2020, which covering green procurement, sustainable product research and development, carbon emission reduction, resource conservation and corporate social responsibility to further strengthen and embody its commitment as an industry leader and promoter of sustainable Factory area roof-top photovoltaic power station development. In response to the Mainland China's

goal of achieving carbon neutrality by 2060, the Group integrates sustainable development into its corporate strategy and day-to-day management, with the mission of establishing a green supply chain.

# ENVIRONMENTAL, SOCIAL AND CORPORATE RESPONSIBILITY (Cont'd)

The Group's efforts in sustainability have been widely recognized in recent years at various levels. Internationally, our Dongguan branch has received the Gold Label of Low Carbon Manufacturing Programme ("LCMP") Certification and Global Recycle Standard ("GRS") Certification. At regional level, our Hangzhou factory has been awarded the "Green Factory in Low Carbon Emission" Certification by the Zhejiang Provincial Government. The above accolades highlight our mindfulness in unwavering commitment to pursuing the highest standards in achieving carbon neutral goals.

Being a socially responsible corporate citizen, the Group also devotes efforts in providing a safe and supportive working environment. Furthermore, the Group helps to build a more connected and vibrant society by making financial and inkind contributions to charitable organizations and individuals in need. Our care to employees and the society have been acknowledged with the awards of "Harmonious Labour Relations Enterprise Certification" and "Spring Action 20th Anniversary Compassion Award Excellent Enterprise" respectively by the Xiaoshan Local Government in Hangzhou.

The Group values and emphasizes our Board and employees at all levels to commit and participate in dedication of sustainability. Through adopting a comprehensive environmental, social and governance ("ESG") structure, the Board takes a leading role in overseeing the Group ESG goals and strategy formulation with the support of ESG Committee in monitoring and evaluating the execution of various ESG policies and projects. Various ESG working groups have been formed in different regions to execute and lead the regional sustainability operations. Regular meetings with ESG Committee are held to report the project progress, challenges and risks. The Risk Management Committee also plays an important role in assessing the ESG risks involved in the Group business and providing appropriate risk management advice. We believe that a well-established ESG framework is an essential component in achieving sustainability.

## LIQUIDITY AND FINANCIAL RESOURCES

As at 31 December 2021, the Group's total bank balance and cash, bank deposit and financial assets amounted to HK\$1.1 billion, compared to HK\$1.3 billion as at 31 December 2020. The decrease in total balances was mainly due to the increase in capital expenditures.

Bank loans decreased from HK\$1.71 billion as at 31 December 2020 to HK\$1.68 billion as at 31 December 2021, bank loans were mainly dominated by HKD. Bank loans are mainly used for a number of property construction, development projects and fixed asset investment for the development and upgrading of the production plants in Mainland China.

The ratio of non-current liabilities to shareholders' funds improved to 46% as at 31 December 2021 (31 December 2020: 48%) and current ratio is 1.5 (31 December 2020: 1.6), revealing that the Group has a solid capital base. The Group's current assets are transformed into long-term investment projects to facilitate the Group's long-term development.

Net cash from operating activities decreased from approximately HK\$107 million in 2020 to approximately HK\$38 million in 2021, mainly due to purchase of raw material to fulfill customers' demand in early 2022. With adequate bank financing and stable income from its own properties, the Management is confident to maintain healthy working capital and liquidity to meet operational needs and future growth.

## FOREIGN CURRENCY RISK EXPOSURE

Foreign currency risk is primarily related to RMB and USD, which is due to the fact that most of our operating expenses are denominated in RMB and most of our sales are denominated in US dollars. The Group complies with the policy of monitoring foreign exchange risks and, where appropriate, will use short-term foreign exchange contracts to minimize its foreign exchange losses. As the Hong Kong dollar is pegged to the USD, the Group management considers that the relevant foreign exchange risks are minimal. Management will continue to take prudential measures to mitigate risks.

### CHARGES ON ASSETS

Apart from HK\$1,390 million for mortgaged properties in Hong Kong (31 December 2020: HK\$1,289 million), the Group has no collateral for other assets.

# CAPITAL EXPENDITURE

The Group has purchased the plant and equipment, leasehold improvement and construction in progress of around HK\$97.3 million in order to upgrade the manufacturing capabilities and improve the environmental protection facilities during the year. The Group also injects HK\$158.0 million into certain properties construction and development projects during the reporting period.

# CAPITAL COMMITMENTS

As at 31 December 2021, the Group is committed to capital expenditure in respect of acquisition of property, plant and equipment and construction work contracted but not provided for amounted to HK\$181.9 million.

# **HUMAN RESOURCES**

The total number of employees of the Group including joint ventures as at the end of the reporting year was about 4,800. Management of the Group made much account of staff training in order to equip the staff with the right knowledge, staff training by face-to-face as well as on-line were held. The Group evaluates its staff according to their performance, qualifications and industry practices. Other than the competitive remuneration package offered to the employees, share options may also be granted to selected employees based on the Group's performance. No share option was granted to employees during the year.

## **EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS**

Mr. LAM Foo Wah, aged 73, is the founder of the Group. Mr. Lam is the Chairman and the chairman of the Nomination Committee of the Company. He was the Managing Director of the Company until February 2020. He is also a director of various subsidiaries of the Company. Mr. Lam is the visionary leader and provides guidance for the overall strategic planning with goals setting for the Group to pursue aggressively. He has over 40 years of experience in manufacturing of apparel industry and marketing of brand and retail management. Mr. Lam is the father of Mr. Lam Gee Yu, Will and Mr. Lam Din Yu, Well, the Executive Directors of the Company. Mr. Lam is a substantial shareholder of the Company within the meaning of Part XV of the Securities and Futures Ordinance. He is also a director of Hinton Company Limited and High Fashion Charitable Foundation Limited, the substantial shareholders of the Company.

Mr. LAM Gee Yu, Will, aged 39, joined the Group in 2010. Mr. Will Lam is an Executive Director, and a member of the Remuneration Committee of the Company. He has been appointed as the Managing Director of the Company since February 2020 and is responsible for the management of all the businesses in the Group. Mr. Will Lam has also been appointed as the chairman of the Risk Management Committee of the Company with effect from the conclusion of the annual general meeting held on 4 June 2021. He is also a director of various subsidiaries of the Company. Mr. Will Lam has been appointed by the Hong Kong Research Institute of Textiles and Apparel Limited (HKRITA) as a member of the board of directors in September 2020. He also currently serves as an honorary president of The Hong Kong Ningxia Youth Association, a president of High Fashion Womenswear Institute, a vice president of Shenzhen Garment Industry Association, a vice president of Hong Kong Hangzhou Entrepreneurs Association, an executive director of the National Council of Zhejiang Zheshang Chuanmei Limited (浙江浙商傳媒有限公司), a member of The Hong Kong Real Property Federation Limited, a member of retail and tourism committee of The Hong Kong General Chamber of Commerce, a member of The Chinese Manufacturers' Association of Hong Kong, a member of The Hong Kong Institute of Directors, a member of The Federation of Hong Kong Garment Manufacturers, a member of Hong Kong 3D Printing Association, a member of the Hong Kong Trade Development Council Garment Advisory Committee and a member of the CreateSmart Initiative Vetting Committee. He holds a Bachelor of Science Degree from The Chinese University of Hong Kong and a Master of Finance Degree from Princeton University. Prior to joining the Group, he worked for an international bank in Asia and an international investment bank in the United States. He is a son of Mr. Lam Foo Wah and a brother of Mr. Lam Din Yu, Well, the Executive Directors of the Company. He is also a director of Hinton Company Limited and High Fashion Charitable Foundation Limited, the substantial shareholders of the Company.

Mr. LAM Din Yu, Well, aged 37, joined the Group in 2006. Mr. Well Lam is an Executive Director and has been appointed as the Managing Director (China) of the Company since February 2020. He is also a director of various subsidiaries of the Company. He is responsible for the group business in the Mainland China, as well as the new business development area. He is also the principal member of China Silk Association, Zhejiang Silk Association, Zhejiang New High-Tech Enterprises Association, Hangzhou Silk Association, Federation of Industry and Commerce of Xiaoshan Hangzhou and International Silk Union. He holds a Bachelor Degree of Business Administration from Boston University. He is a son of Mr. Lam Foo Wah and a brother of Mr. Lam Gee Yu, Will, the Executive Directors of the Company. He is also a director of Hinton Company Limited and High Fashion Charitable Foundation Limited, the substantial shareholders of the Company.

Ms. SO Siu Hang, Patricia, aged 63, joined the Group in 1990. Ms. So is an Executive Director and a director of various subsidiaries of the Company. She is responsible for the Group's global business development, strategic planning and implementation. She has an in-depth knowledge of the fashion apparel industry and substantial valuable experience in value chain management and e-commerce sales and marketing. She holds a Bachelor Degree in Commerce and Finance from the University of Toronto and a Master Degree in Business Administration from York University in Canada. Prior to joining the Group, she worked for Standard Chartered Bank for 4 years.

## NON-EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Mr. HUNG Ka Hai Clement, aged 66, joined the Group in 2017. Mr. Hung is a Non-executive Director of the Company and a member of the Audit Committee of the Company. He had served Deloitte China for 31 years. He retired from the chairman role of Deloitte China in June 2016 and had represented Deloitte China in the Deloitte Global Board and Governance Committee as a member during at that time. Mr. Hung assumed various leadership roles in Deloitte, including, the audit group leader and office managing partner of Deloitte Shenzhen Office and Guangzhou Office. He was also a member of the China Management Team of Deloitte China. Later on, Mr. Hung assumed the role of the southern audit leader and the deputy managing partner of the Southern Region (including Hong Kong, Macau, Shenzhen, Guangzhou, Xiamen and Changsha).

Mr. Hung was an honorary member of the Shenzhen Institute of Certified Public Accountants in 2004. He served as the Guangzhou Institute of Certified Public Accountants consultant from 2004 to 2014. From 2006 to 2011, he also served as a member of the Political Consultative Committee of Luohu District, Shenzhen. In June 2016, the Ministry of Finance of People's Republic of China appointed Mr. Hung as an expert consultant under his extensive experience as a Hong Kong accounting professional. He is a life member of The Institute of Chartered Accountants in England and Wales. He obtained a Bachelor of Arts Degree from the University of Lincoln (formerly known as "Huddersfield University") in United Kingdom in 1980.

Mr. Hung is an independent non-executive director of Gome Finance Technology Co., Ltd., SY Holdings Group Limited (formerly known as "Sheng Ye Capital Limited"), Aoyuan Healthy Life Group Company Limited, China East Education Holdings Limited, Huarong International Financial Holdings Limited and Skyworth Group Limited, the shares of these companies are listed on The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited (the "Stock Exchange"). He has been appointed as an independent non-executive director of Hong Kong Aerospace Technology Group Limited with effect from 16 July 2021, the shares of which are listed on the Stock Exchange.

He has served as an independent non-executive director of Zhongchang International Holdings Group Limited until June 2020 and retired as an independent non-executive director of Tibet Water Resources Ltd. until the conclusion of its annual general meeting held on 30 June 2021, both companies' shares are listed on the Stock Exchange. He has also served as a non-executive director of SMI Holdings Group Limited until February 2019, a company delisted from the Stock Exchange in December 2020.

## INDEPENDENT NON-EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS

Professor YEUNG Kwok Wing, aged 74, joined the Group in 2000. Professor Yeung has been re-designated as an Independent Non-executive Director from a Non-executive Director of the Company with effect from 4 June 2021. He is a member of the Audit Committee, Remuneration Committee, Nomination Committee and Risk Management Committee of the Company. He is currently the executive director of Clothing Industry Training Authority ("CITA") in Hong Kong. He holds a PhD from the Queen's University of Belfast, Northern Ireland. Professor Yeung specializes in textile product development, quality assurance and management, and serves as various honorary fellows and members of international associations of textile, dvers and colorists as well. He has a long and distinguished academic career and was associated with The Hong Kong Polytechnic University ("PolyU") for more than 30 years before joining CITA in June 2006. His administrative ability is also highly appreciated in PolyU when he was posted as its vice president overseeing academic development from 2002 to 2005.

Mr. LEUNG Hok Lim, CPA (Macau), aged 86, joined the Group in 2004. Mr. Leung is an Independent Non-executive Director, the chairman of the Audit Committee, and a member of the Remuneration Committee, Nomination Committee and Risk Management Committee of the Company. Mr. Leung is the founder and senior partner of PKF. Mr. Leung is an independent non-executive director of Phoneix Media Investment (Holdings) Limited and was an independent nonexecutive director of Fujian Holdings Limited, the shares of these companies are listed on the Stock Exchange. He retired as an independent non-executive director of S E A Holdings Limited, the shares of which are listed on the Stock Exchange, with effect from the conclusion of its annual general meeting held on 28 May 2021.

Mr. Chung Kwok Pan, aged 58, joined the Group in July 2019. He was also a member of the 5th and 6th Legislative Council of Hong Kong (Textile and Garment Sector) and a member of the 9th Guangdong Provincial Committee of the Chinese People's Political Consultative Conference in 2005. Mr. Chung is an independent non-executive director of Planetree International Development Limited and Esprit Holdings Limited, the shares of these companies are listed on the Stock Exchange. He has been appointed as an independent non-executive director of Legendary Group Limited (formerly known as "L&A International Holdings Limited"), with effect from 2 June 2021, the shares of which are listed on the Stock Exchange. Mr. Chung obtained a Bachelor's Degree in Quantity Surveying from Robert Gordon's Institute of Technology, Scotland (currently known as "Robert Gordon University, Aberdeen") in July 1986 and a Master's Degree in Business Administration from the University of Stirling, Scotland, United Kingdom in May 1988.

## SENIOR MANAGEMENT

Ms. LEUNG Suk Yin, Hilda, aged 65, has been with the Group since its inception. She is the vice chairman of High Fashion (China) Co., Ltd. and a director of various subsidiaries of the Company. Ms. Leung holds a diploma in business management from The Hong Kong Polytechnic University and The Hong Kong Management Association. She has over 40 years of experience in the marketing, merchandising and production of garments.

Mr. RUAN Gen Yao, aged 61, joined the Group in 2001. He is the vice chairman of High Fashion (China) Co., Ltd. He is also a director and the general manager of Zhejiang Dali Culture Creativity Co., Ltd. and is responsible for the operation of that company. He is a politician engineer in China and Labour Model of Hangzhou and the representation of The People's Congress of Tonglu, China. He has over 25 years' experience in silk finishing and dveing industry and extensive experience in business management.

Mr. LIN Ping, aged 61, joined the Group in 1993. He is the chairman and the CEO of High Fashion Silk (Zhejiang) Co., Ltd. and is responsible for the operation and administration. He serves as vice president of Chinese Textile Enterprisers Association, vice president of China Silk Association, vice president of China Fashion Color Association, vice president of Silk Branch of China Textile Chamber of Commerce, vice president of China Silk Quilt Association, an executive member of China Textile Photography Association, president of Zhejiang Industry Tourism Association, vice president of Zhejiang Textile Association, vice president of Zhejiang Province Silk Association, vice president of Shaoxing Textile Association, vice president of Shaoxing Tourism Association, representative of 6th and 7th NPC of Shaoxing, representative of 13th, 14th and 15th NPC of Xinchang, creative consultant of Donghua University, professor and tutor for master degree of Wuhan Textile University, part-time professor of Zhejiang Sci-Tech University and honorary professor of Hangzhou Vocational Technical College. He was the dean of High Fashion Women Wear Institute. He attains EMBA education and is the senior economist in China. He has over 40 years' experience in textile industry and extensive experience in product design and development, silk weaving production and management.

An interim dividend of 2 HK cents per ordinary share was paid on 15 October 2021. The board of Directors (the "Board") recommends the payment of a final dividend of 6 HK cents per ordinary share for the year ended 31 December 2021 to shareholders whose names appear on the Register of Members of the Company on Wednesday, 22 June 2022 (2020: 3 HK cents per ordinary share). The proposed final dividend is subject to the approval of shareholders of the Company at the forthcoming annual general meeting to be held on Tuesday, 14 June 2022 (the "2022 AGM"). If being approved, dividend warrants for the final dividend is expected to be despatched on Friday, 15 July 2022. - (b) the working capital requirements for future business needs and expansion plans of the Group;

- (e) general economic conditions and other internal and external factors which may have an impact on the financial and business performance of the Group; and
- (f) any other factors that the Board deems relevant.

The Board is at its discretion to declare interim dividends. The recommendation of final dividends is subject to the approval of shareholders at general meetings of the Company. The payment of dividends is subject to the restrictions under the Memorandum of Association and Bye-laws of the Company and other applicable laws. Dividends may be distributed in cash or be satisfied wholly or partly in the form of securities of the Company pursuant to the Bye-laws of the Company (the "Bye-laws").

The Board will review the policy from time to time and has absolute and sole discretion to update, amend or modify the policy.

The Board and the management of the Company are committed to maintaining good corporate governance practices and procedures to enable an effective Board, the long-term success and sustainability of the Company. The Company believes that good corporate governance provides a framework that is essential for effective strategic management and risk control as well as enhancement of shareholders' value and communication. The corporate governance principles of the Company emphasize a quality and diversified Board with responsible decision-making aligning with corporate cultures and values, independent and objective views on the Board, sound and effective risk management and internal control systems, improvement in accountability and transparency to all shareholders with recognition of their legitimate interests.

The Company has complied with all the code provisions of the Corporate Governance Code (the "CG Code") as set out in Appendix 14 to the Listing Rules on the Stock Exchange throughout the year ended 31 December 2021, except for the deviations as described below:

## **CODE PROVISION A.4.1\***

Under the code provision A.4.1 of the CG Code, non-executive directors should be appointed for a specific term, subject to re-election.

The current Non-executive Directors and Independent Non-executive Directors were not appointed for a specific term. However, as all Directors are eligible for re-election and subject to retirement by rotation at the annual general meetings of the Company in accordance with Bye-law 87 of the Bye-laws and code provision A.4.2\* of the CG Code, the Board considers that sufficient resources have been taken to ensure that the Company's corporate governance practices are no less than exacting than those in the CG Code.

# **CODE PROVISION D.1.4\***

Under the code provision D.1.4 of the CG Code, directors should clearly understand delegation arrangements in place and listed companies should have formal letters of appointment for directors setting out the key terms and conditions of their appointment.

The Board considers that although there are no formal letters of appointment entered into between the Company and the Directors, the current arrangement has been adopted for years and proved to be effective, more appropriate and flexible for the business operation of the Company. The Directors also have a clear understanding of the terms and conditions of their appointment with close communication with the Company and awareness on their relevant rights and duties pursuant to the applicable laws and regulations.

\* With effect from 1 January 2022, code provision A.4.1 has been deleted, code provisions A.4.2 and D.1.4 have been re-designated as B.2.2 and C.3.3 respectively in the CG Code.

Pursuant to Rule 3.10A of the Listing Rules, listed issuers should appoint independent non-executive directors representing at least one-third of the board. As at the date of this annual report, the Board comprises eight Directors, in which the number of Independent Non-executive Directors represents one-third of the Board. One of the three Independent Non-executive Directors has appropriate professional qualifications, or accounting or related financial management expertise.

During the financial year, each of the Independent Non-executive Directors has made an annual confirmation of independence pursuant to Rule 3.13 of the Listing Rules. The Company considers that all Independent Non-executive Directors meet the independence guidelines set out in Rule 3.13 of the Listing Rules and are independent. None of the Independent Non-executive Directors holds cross-directorships or has significant links with other Directors through involvement in other companies or bodies.

## Directors' and Officers' Insurance

Appropriate insurance cover on Directors' and officers' liabilities has been in force to protect the Directors and officers of the Group from their risk exposure arising from the businesses of the Group. Regular review of the insurance coverage and amount is conducted.

## **Board Meetings**

During the year, four regular Board meetings were held for facilitating the function of the Board. The Chairman of the Board (the "Chairman") met with the Independent Non-executive Directors once without the presence of other Directors. In any event, all Directors were available for consultation by management from time to time.

In order to ensure that the Board is able to fulfill its responsibilities, it has established and delegated specific authority to the Audit Committee, Remuneration Committee, Nomination Committee and Risk Management Committee with specific matters as defined in the respective terms of reference. The main duties and meeting details of these committees are stipulated on pages 32 to 39 of this annual report.

The Company provides at least 14 days' notices of every Board meeting to all Directors. Board papers are circulated not less than 3 days before the Board meetings to enable the Directors to make informed decisions on matters to be raised at the Board meetings.

During the financial year, the Finance Director and the Company Secretary attended the regular Board meetings to advise on corporate governance, statutory compliance, accounting and financial matters when necessary. Directors had full access to information on the Group and were able to seek independent professional advice, upon reasonable request and at the expense of the Company, whenever deemed necessary by the Directors. The Company Secretary prepared minutes and kept records of matters discussed and decisions resolved at all Board meetings.

# CHAIRMAN AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

Managing Directors assume the roles and responsibilities of a chief executive officer of the Company. The roles of the Chairman and the Managing Directors are complementary but distinct and separate with clear division of delegation and accountabilities.

# CHAIRMAN AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER (Cont'd)

The Board, led by the Chairman, is responsible for adopting and promoting corporate culture and visions; approving and monitoring the Group's overall strategies and policies; approving the financial budget; evaluating the performance of the Group against targets and objectives; ensuring compliance with regulations; and ensuring effective shareholders' communication. The important roles of the Chairman are to provide leadership to the Board, monitor and evaluate Board effectiveness with consideration of Board diversity and independent views from the Independent Non-executive Directors and encourage all Directors to make a full and active contribution to the Board's affairs so as to ensure that the Board acts in the best interests of the Group. The Chairman ensures that all key and appropriate issues are discussed by the Board in a timely manner. All Directors have been consulted about any matters proposed for inclusion in the agenda. The Chairman has delegated the responsibility for drawing up the agenda for each Board meeting to the Company Secretary.

Management is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the Group under the leadership of the Chairman. The Managing Directors, working with the other Executive Directors and the executive management team of each business division, is responsible for managing the businesses of the Group, including drawing up strategies and business development plans for Board approval, implementation of strategies adopted by the Board and assuming full accountability to the Board for the operations of the Group. All Directors have full and free access to the Group's information to ensure informed decision making and have made full and active contribution to the affairs of the Board.

With the support from Executive Directors and the Company Secretary, the Chairman seeks to ensure that all Directors are properly briefed on issues arising at Board meetings and receives adequate and reliable information in a timely manner. Apart from the regular Board meetings, the Chairman holds meetings with the Independent Non-executive Directors without the presence of other Directors.

# **BOARD COMMITTEES**

The Board delegates its powers and authorities from time to time to committees in order to ensure the operational efficiency and specific issues are being handled by relevant expertise. Four Board committees have been established and each of them has its specific duties and authorities setting out in its own terms of reference. Written terms of reference, which are in line with the CG Code, of each of the Audit Committee, the Remuneration Committee and the Nomination Committee are available on the websites of the Company and the Stock Exchange. The members of the Board committees as at the date of this annual report is set out in the "Corporate Information" section on page 159 of this annual report. The attendance record of members of the Board committees in 2021 is set out in the "Directors' attendance records" section above.

Each Committee is provided with sufficient resources to perform its duties and where necessary, to seek independent professional advice, at the Company's expense, to perform its responsibility.

### **Audit Committee**

As at the date of this annual report, the Audit Committee comprises one Non-executive Director and three Independent Non-executive Directors, at least one of whom has appropriate professional qualifications, or accounting or related financial management expertise. The Audit Committee adopted the terms of reference with reference to the guidelines issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants and in accordance with the requirements of the CG Code.

No member of the Audit Committee is a former partner of the existing auditing firm of the Company during the two years after he/she ceases to be a partner of the auditing firm.

The main duties of the Audit Committee are set out below:

- (i) to recommend to the Board on the appointment, reappointment and removal of the external auditors, and address any questions of resignation or dismissal of the auditors;
- (ii) to review and monitor the external auditors' independence and objectivity and the effectiveness of the audit process in accordance with applicable standards;
- (iii) to develop and implement policy on the engagement of external auditors to supply non-audit services;
- (iv)to monitor integrity of financial statements, annual and interim reports of the Company and accounts, and to review significant financial reporting judgements contained in such reports;
- (v) to review the Company's financial controls, internal control and risk management systems;
- to review and monitor the effectiveness of the internal audit function; and (vi)
- to review the Group's financial and accounting policies and practices. (vii)

During the year, the Audit Committee held three regular meetings to:

- (a) review the interim and annual financial reports and consolidated financial statements of the Group;
- (b) review with the external auditors and the management on the audit report issued by the external auditors of the Company covering the audit approach and methodology applied in key audit matters;
- (c) review and endorse the changes in accounting and auditing standards;
- (d) review the significant findings and recommendations from the internal audit department and the external auditors of the Company;
- (e) review and approve the internal audit plan of the Group for 2021;
- (f) review and provide supervision of the Group's financial reporting system;
- (g) evaluate the adequacy and effectiveness of the risk management and internal control systems and internal audit functions; and
- (h) review the independence of the external auditors of the Company, approve the scope and nature of audit services and the 2021 audit fee.

The Group places high standard and strict compliance of code of conduct as one of the important corporate cultures. The Board adopted the whistle-blowing policy setting out the approach for employees and those who deal with the Company (eg. customers and suppliers) to raise concerns on any possible misconduct, violation of company policies or fraudulent activities, in confidence, with the designated committee about possible improprieties in any matter related to the Company. All complaints and whistle-blowing are directed to the internal audit department for concurrent investigations. The Company shall present the quarterly whistle-blowing report to the Audit Committee for review, if any.

#### **Remuneration Committee**

As at the date of this annual report, the Remuneration Committee comprises one Executive Director and three Independent Non-executive Directors.

The main duties of the Remuneration Committee are set out below:

- (i) to make recommendations to the Board on the Company's policy and structure for remuneration of Directors and senior management;
- to review the specific remuneration packages of all Executive Directors and senior management by reference to (ii) corporate goals and objectives resolved by the Board from time to time;
- to make recommendation to the Board on the remuneration packages of, including benefits in kind, pension rights (iii) and compensation payments, of individual Executive Directors and senior management;
- to make recommendations to the Board on the remuneration of Non-executive Directors; and (iv)
- to consider salaries paid by comparable companies, time commitment and responsibilities and employment conditions elsewhere in the Group.

The Remuneration Committee consulted the Chairman about their proposals relating to remuneration package and other human resources issues of the Directors and senior management of the Company. The emoluments of Directors and senior management are based on the skill, knowledge, duties and responsibilities of each Director and senior management and are determined by reference to the Company's performance and profitability, as well as remuneration benchmark in the industry and the prevailing market conditions.

### Nomination Policy

To facilitate the succession planning and refreshment of the Board in the purpose of business development, the Nomination Committee nominates candidates and re-election of Directors on the basis of the Nomination Policy as summarized below:

#### 1. Selection Criteria

The selection of potential candidates is based on the merit and the benefits of diversity on the Board, including but not limited to gender, age, cultural and educational background, professional experience, time devotion and other qualities. The independence requirements under the Listing Rules would also be considered for the potential candidate as an Independent Non-executive Director.

#### 2. Nomination Procedures

### Appointment of Directors

The Nomination Committee identifies and ascertains the integrity, qualification, experience and expertise of the potential candidates based on the criteria set above. If the candidate is considered qualified, the Nomination Committee makes recommendations for the Board consideration. The Board would appoint the candidate to fill a casual vacancy or as an addition to the Board or recommend the candidates to stand for election at a general meeting after due consideration and discussion over the qualification of the candidate.

The nomination was made in accordance with the Nomination Policy and other objective criteria including but not limited to gender, age, cultural and educational background, professional experience, skills and knowledge relevant to the Company's corporate goals and strategies set out in the Board Diversity Policy and the independence guidelines pursuant to the Listing Rules.

### Re-election of Directors

The Nomination Committee reviews the contribution made by the retiring Directors and whether his capabilities and qualifications continue to satisfy the criteria above and the corporate goals and strategies. The Board would then under the advice of the Nomination Committee, make recommendations to the shareholders of the Company for the re-election of Directors at the general meetings.

Review of the Nomination Policy

The Nomination Committee reviews the Nomination Policy from time to time to ensure its effectiveness. Any necessary amendments will be recommended to the Board for consideration and approval.

In accordance with Bye-law 87 of the Bye-laws, every Director shall be subject to retirement by rotation at least once every three years and that one-third (or the number nearest to one-third) of the Directors shall retire from office every year at annual general meeting of the Company and being eligible for re-election. Mr. Lam Din Yu, Well, Ms. So Siu Hang, Patricia and Mr. Leung Hok Lim will retire from office and be eligible for re-election at the 2022 AGM. Ms. So Siu Hang, Patricia and Mr. Leung Hok Lim have indicated that they will not stand for re-election and will retire at the 2022 AGM. Mr. Lam Din Yu, Well, being eligible, has offered himself for re-election at the 2022 AGM. The Nomination Committee recommended to the Board on the re-election of the retiring Director on the basis of the Nomination Policy. Further details will be set out in the circular to shareholders to be despatched with this annual report.

The re-election of Directors is conducted through a separate resolution and there is no cumulative voting in Director elections. None of the Directors who are proposed for re-election at the forthcoming annual general meeting has a service contract with the Company which is not determinable by the Company within one year without payment of compensation, other than statutory compensation.

### **Board Diversity Policy**

The Board adopted the Board Diversity Policy in March 2013 for setting the approach to achieve diversity of the Board. The Company recognises that increasing diversity at the Board level is an essential element to attain strategic objectives and thus enhance the balance, quality and sustainability of its performance. The Policy highlights the benefits of a diversified Board and a number of factors including but not limited to gender, age, cultural and educational background, professional experience, skills and knowledge are considered in designing the composition of the Board. The Nomination Committee is responsible for the implementation and conducting regular review on this policy to make necessary amendments for the Board approval.

All Non-executive Directors are professionals with extensive experience in garments and fashion, accounting and business fields and make major contribution to the strategy planning, risk and management control and future development of the Company. In considering the Board's succession, the Nomination Committee would continue to identify potential candidates for Non-executive Directors, as and when appropriate.

## **Risk Management Committee**

As at the date of this annual report, the Risk Management Committee comprises one Executive Director and three Independent Non-executive Directors.

The main duties of the Risk Management Committee are set out below:

- (i) to advise the Audit Committee and the Board on the Group's risk appetite statement(s), risk principles and other risk-related issues;
- to oversee risk management framework to identify and deal with financial, operational, legal, regulatory, technology, (ii) business and strategic, environmental and social risks faced by the Group and amend and supplement this from time to time;
- (iii) to review risk reports and breaches of risk tolerances and policies;
- to review and assess the effectiveness of the Group's risk control/mitigation tools; and (iv)
- to review and oversee the environmental and social sustainable development and strategies, evaluate the adequacy and effectiveness of the Group's sustainability and report to the Board the sustainability risks and opportunities.

During the year, the Risk Management Committee met once to discuss the risk exposure facing the Group in various aspects and the corresponding mitigation measures.

Key risk exposures of the Group identified are set out in the "Management Discussion and Analysis" section of this annual report.

# CORPORATE GOVERNANCE FUNCTIONS

The Board is responsible for performing the corporate governance duties. Specific terms of reference are set out in the Terms of Reference of the Board and the relevant duties include the following:

- 1. to develop and review the Company's policies and practices on corporate governance, if appropriate, raise recommendations;
- 2. to review and monitor the training and continuous professional development of Directors and senior management;
- 3. to review and monitor the Company's policies and practices on compliance with legal and regulatory requirements;
- 4. to develop, review and monitor the code of conduct and compliance manual (if any) applicable to employees and Directors; and
- 5. to review the Company's compliance with the code and disclosure in the Corporate Governance Report.

### MODEL CODE FOR SECURITIES TRANSACTIONS

The Company has adopted the Model Code as its own code of conduct regarding Directors' securities transactions.

Confirmation has been sought from all Directors and they have complied with the required standard set out in the Model Code for the year ended 31 December 2021.

The Company has established the written guidelines on no less exacting terms than the Model Code relating to securities transactions for the relevant employees.

### DIRECTORS' CONTINUOUS PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Comprehensive orientation packages on the Group's business and structure, terms of reference of the Board and committees, corporate governance practices and policies, Directors' rights and duties and updates on applicable laws, rules and regulations are provided for newly appointed Directors.

To keep abreast of the latest industry trends and practices as well as the risks and opportunities facing the Group, the Directors acknowledge the need to update and refresh their knowledge and skills necessary for making contributions to the Company. During the year, Directors were invited to attend the seminars and conferences conducted by external industry experts on various topics of interests including review of notifiable and connected transactions, preparation of financial statements, continuing disclosure obligations and updates of the ESG trends and guidelines. Articles and publication of relevant governance updates are regularly provided to the Directors.

All Directors are required to provide and confirm their annual training records to the Company. The participation by every Director in the continuous professional development programme with various topics in 2021 is recorded in the table below.

### **ACCOUNTABILITY AND AUDIT**

## Financial Reporting

The Directors acknowledge their responsibility for overseeing, with support from the Finance Department, the preparation of the consolidated financial statements of the Group.

The Directors are responsible for ensuring that the financial statements are prepared on a "going concern" basis and give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the consolidated financial position of the Group in accordance with the applicable laws and regulations. In preparing the accounts for the year ended 31 December 2021, the Directors believe that they have selected appropriate accounting policies which are applied in consistency, made judgments and estimates that are prudent and reasonable, and ensured the financial statements are prepared on a "going concern" basis.

The final and interim results of the Company are announced in a timely manner within the limits of three months and two months respectively after the end of the relevant year or period.

A statement by the Auditors of the Company about their reporting responsibilities on the consolidated financial statements of the Group is set out in the "Independent Auditor's Report" section on pages 47 to 51 of this annual report.

#### **External Auditors**

The Group has engaged Deloitte Touche Tohmatsu to perform audit services for the year ended 31 December 2021. The Group paid or payable to Deloitte Touche Tohmatsu in respect of audit services fee and non-audit services (including review, reporting and tax services) amounted to approximately HK\$3,200,000 and HK\$410,000 respectively.

## **Risk Management**

The Board has overall responsibility for maintaining a sound and effective risk management and internal control system (including those for ESG-related risks) and reviewing its effectiveness to safeguard the interests of the shareholders and the Group's assets. The Board is committed to the identification, management and monitoring the nature and extent of risks associated with its business activities and strategic objectives. The Board carries out annual review on the risk management system on the advice of the Risk Management Committee.

Review of the Group's risk management covering major operational, financial, business, information system, human resources, ESG and compliance controls of different systems and has been done on a systematic and on-going basis based on the risk assessments of the operations and controls for the year ended 31 December 2021. The adequacy of resources, staff qualifications and experience, training programmes and budget of the Company's accounting, internal audit and financial reporting functions is ensured. No major issue but areas for improvement have been identified during the year. The Board, the Audit Committee and the Risk Management Committee considered that the present risk management controls of the Group are reasonably implemented and effective.

# ACCOUNTABILITY AND AUDIT (Cont'd)

## Risk Management (Cont'd)

In addition, up to the date of approval of the Company's 2021 Annual Report based on the respective assessments made by the management and also taking into account the results of the audit conducted by the external auditors, the Audit Committee and the Directors considered that:

- (i) the risk management and accounting systems of the Group are designed to provide reasonable but not absolute assurance that material assets are protected, business risks attributable to the Group are identified and monitored, material transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and the financial statements are reliable for publication;
- (ii) the risk management systems of the Group have been implemented with room for improvement and the Group internal audit department has actively conducted follow-up audit for any improvements which were identified; and
- (iii) there is an on-going process in place for identifying, evaluating and managing significant risks faced by the Group.

#### **Internal Control**

The Board conducts reviews of the effectiveness of the internal control system for the year ended 31 December 2021 covering all material controls, including financial, operational and compliance controls and risk management functions by considering reviews performed by the Risk Management Committee, Audit Committee, executive management and both the Group internal audit department and external auditors. The Group's system of internal control comprises a defined management structure with limits of authority, is designed to help the achievement of business objectives, safeguard assets against unauthorised use or disposition, ensure the maintenance of proper accounting records for the provision of reliable financial information for internal use or for publication, and ensure compliance with relevant legislation and regulations.

The system is designed to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance against material misstatement or loss and to manage rather than eliminate risks of failure in operational systems and achievement of the Group's objectives.

The criteria for the Board to assess the effectiveness of the system of internal control are listed below:

# (i) Organisational Structure

An organisational structure with operating policies and procedures, lines of responsibility and delegated authority has been already established.

### (ii) Authority and Control

The relevant Executive Directors and senior management are delegated with respective levels of authorities with regard to key corporate strategy and policy and contractual commitments. The Board is responsible for handling and dissemination of inside information through discussion and delegation of authority to the Company Secretary.

# Internal Control (Cont'd)

#### (iii) Budgetary Control and Financial Reporting

Budgets are prepared annually by the senior management and are subject to review and approval of the Executive Directors prior to being adopted. There are procedures for the appraisal, review and approval of major capital and recurrent expenditure. Results of operations against budgets are reported regularly to the Executive Directors. Proper controls are in place for the recording of complete, accurate and timely accounting and management information. Regular reviews and audits are carried out to ensure that the preparation of consolidated financial statements is carried out in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, the Group's accounting policies and applicable laws and regulations.

#### Systems and Procedures (iv)

Systems and procedures are set to identify, measure, manage and control risks including business, compliance, operational, financial and information services risks that may have an impact on the Group and each principal division. Exposure to these risks is monitored by the Executive Directors and the management of the respective principal divisions.

#### (v) Internal Audit

The Group internal audit department performs independent reviews of the controls and risks identified to provide reasonable assurance to the management of the Company and principal divisions and the Audit Committee that controls have been set in place and adequately addressed.

The Group internal audit department monitors compliance with policies and procedures as well as the effectiveness of internal control structures across the Company and the Group. The effectiveness of internal control system is reviewed annually. To preserve the independence of the Group internal audit department, the Group internal audit department reports directly to the Audit Committee. The Group internal audit department plans its internal audit schedules annually in consultation with, but independent of, the management of the Group and the principal divisions. In addition to its agreed annual schedule of work, the Group internal audit department conducts other special reviews as required. As a key criterion of assessing the effectiveness of the internal control system, the Board and the Audit Committee actively monitor the number and seriousness of findings raised by the Group internal audit department and also the corrective actions taken by relevant departments.

According to the 2021 internal audit reports, the Group's internal control system is functioning effectively and there was no significant weakness found in the course of the audits carried out during the year. The Board, through the Audit Committee and the internal audit function, has reviewed the effectiveness of the Group's internal control system and is of the view that there are no suspected frauds, irregularities, internal control deficiencies or suspected infringement of laws, rules and regulations that cause the Board to believe that the systems are ineffective or inadequate. The Board is satisfied that the Company and the Group have fully complied with the code provisions on internal control as set forth in the CG Code for the year ended 31 December 2021.

# ACCOUNTABILITY AND AUDIT (Cont'd)

### Internal Control (Cont'd)

The Group complies with the requirements of the SFO and the Listing Rules in the disclosure of inside information to the public as soon as reasonably practicable unless it is exempted under the Information Disclosure Provisions. Before the information is fully disclosed to the public, the Group ensures that the information is kept strictly confidential. Where the Group believes that the necessary degree of confidentiality cannot be maintained or that confidentiality may have been breached, the Group would immediately disclose the information to the public. The Group ensures that the information contained in an announcement be accurate and complete in all material respects and not be misleading or deceptive, and there are no omissions that would make the information misleading. The information would be presented in a clear and balanced way, which requires equal disclosure of both positive and negative facts.

# **COMPANY SECRETARY**

Ms. Yung Pik Man, the Company Secretary and Finance Director, is a full-time employee of the Company and has day-to-day knowledge of the Company's affairs. All Directors have access to the advice and services of the Company Secretary. The Company Secretary reports to the Chairman and is responsible for ensuring that Board procedures and all applicable rules and regulations are followed as well as bridging the information flows and communications among all Directors, the management and shareholders. For the year ended 31 December 2021, Ms. Yung has complied with Rule 3.29 of the Listing Rules by taking over 15 hours of relevant professional training during her tenure as the Company Secretary.

# CONSTITUTIONAL DOCUMENTS

During the year, there was no change in the Company's constitutional documents.

# COMMUNICATION WITH SHAREHOLDERS

The Board recognises the importance of communication with our shareholders to facilitate their understanding of the Group's prospects and business. In March 2012, the Company adopted a shareholders communication policy to set out the Company's processes to provide shareholders and investment public with equal and timely information on the Company for them to make informed assessments of the Company's strategy, operations and financial performance.

# COMMUNICATION WITH SHAREHOLDERS (Cont'd)

### **General Meeting**

Holding general meetings is a means to establish constructive dialogue with shareholders. Shareholders are encouraged to participate in general meetings or to appoint proxies to attend and vote at meetings for and on their behalf if they are unable to attend the meeting in person. The process of the Company's general meeting will be reviewed from time to time to ensure the compliance with the relevant requirements of the Listing Rules and the relevant legislations.

#### At the 2021 AGM held:

- (i) a separate resolution was proposed by the Chairman of that meeting in respect of each separate issue, including the re-election of Directors.
- the Chairman of the Board, and Chairmen of the Audit Committee and Nomination Committee, members from (ii) the respective committees and key executives of the Company, attended the 2021 AGM to address shareholders' queries.
- (iii) external auditors attended the 2021 AGM and was available to assist the Directors in addressing gueries from shareholders relating to the conduct of the audit and the preparation and content of its auditor's report.
- (iv)all resolutions were voted by poll according to Rule 13.39(4) of the Listing Rules and Bye-law 66 of the Bye-laws. Tricor Secretaries Limited, the Company's Hong Kong branch share registrar and transfer office, was engaged as scrutineer to ensure the votes were properly counted.

The poll results of the 2021 AGM are available on the websites of the Stock Exchange and the Company.

The 2022 AGM will be held at 11/F., High Fashion Centre, 1-11 Kwai Hei Street, Kwai Chung, New Territories, Hong Kong on Tuesday, 14 June 2022 at 11 a.m. All the proposed resolutions will be voted by poll pursuant to the Listing Rules. Notice of the 2022 AGM, which constitutes part of a circular to shareholders, will be despatched together with this annual report and the proxy form. The poll results of the 2022 AGM will be published on the websites of the Stock Exchange and the Company shortly after the conclusion of the 2022 AGM.

In light of the uncertain development of the current COVID-19 pandemic development, all the shareholders are reminded that they may appoint the chairman of the meeting as their proxy to vote on the relevant resolutions at the 2022 AGM as an alternative to attending the meeting in person. Additional pre-cautionary measures will be implemented in accordance with the legislations and guidelines to ensure safety of every attendee. The Company may implement further changes and precautionary measures, and may issue further announcement on such measures or meeting arrangement as appropriate.

# Procedures for shareholders convening meetings

The Company holds a general meeting as its annual general meeting every year. Each general meeting, other than annual general meeting, shall be called a special general meeting ("SGM").

### Procedures for shareholders convening meetings (Cont'd)

Pursuant to Bye-law 58 of the Bye-Laws, shareholder(s) of the Company holding at the date of the deposit of the requisition not less than one-tenth of the paid-up capital of the Company carrying the right of voting at general meetings of the Company shall at all times have the right, by written requisition to the Board or Company Secretary, to require a SGM to be called by the Board for the transaction of any business specified in such requisition. The written requisition must be deposited at the Company's head office and principal place of business in Hong Kong, for the attention of the Company Secretary.

Such meeting shall be held within two months after the deposit of such requisition. If within 21 days of such deposit the Board fails to proceed to convene such meeting, the requisitionists themselves may do so in accordance with the Bermuda Companies Act 1981.

### Procedures for shareholders putting forward proposals

Pursuant to the Bermuda Companies Act 1981, shareholder(s) of the Company representing not less than one-twentieth of the total voting rights at the date of the requisition or not less than 100 shareholders may put forward a proposal at general meeting, by sending a written requisition to the Board at the Company's head office and principal place of business in Hong Kong. The proposal should be stated in the written requisition and such written requisition should be submitted as early as practicable to enable the Company to make necessary arrangement (in case of a requisition requiring notice of a resolution, not less than six weeks before the meeting; and in case of any other requisition, not less than one week before the meeting).

### Procedures for shareholders nominating Directors

Pursuant to Bye-law 88 of the Bye-Laws, any shareholder, shall at all times have the right, to propose a person other than a retiring Director for election as a Director at a general meeting of the Company. The Company's procedures for shareholders to propose a person for election as a Director are available on the Company's website.

### **Investor Relations**

The Company has adopted and regularly reviews Shareholders Communication Policy to ensure that the views and concerns raised by the shareholders are properly addressed. The Company has established different communication channels with shareholders and investors: (i) shareholders can receive printed copies of corporate information and correspondence; (ii) the general meeting provides a forum for shareholders to raise comments and exchange views with the Board, (iii) the Company's website offers communication channel between the Company and its shareholders and investors; (iv) the Company's Hong Kong branch share registrar and transfer office serve the shareholders respecting all share registration matters; and (v) investor/analysts briefings and media interviews and marketing activities for investors will be available where necessary to facilitate communication between the Company and the investment public.

Shareholders may also send their enquiries in writing to the Company's head office and principal place of business in Hong Kong by email to info@highfashion.com.hk for the attention of the Company Secretary.

Information in relation to the Group is disseminated to shareholders in a timely manner through a number of formal channels, which include interim and annual reports, announcements and circulars. ### Valuation of investment properties

We identified valuation of investment properties, including properties transferred to investment properties during the year, as a key audit matter due to the significance of the balance to the consolidated financial statements as a whole, combined with the judgment and estimate associated with determining the fair value.

The Group's investment properties portfolio comprises office properties, retail premises and commercial complex. The carrying value of the Group's investment properties amounted to approximately HK\$3,101,216,000 as at 31 December 2021.

As set out in note 17 of the consolidated financial statements, during the year ended 31 December 2021, certain property, plant and equipment and right-of-use assets with carrying amounts of HK\$98,973,000 and HK\$1,319,000, respectively, were transferred to investment properties due to end of owner-occupation. Fair value at the date of transfer was approximately HK\$138,366,000. The difference between the carrying amounts and the fair value of these properties of HK\$38,074,000 was credited to property revaluation reserve.

The fair value change recognised in profit or loss in respect of these investment properties was approximately HK\$129,443,000 for the year ended 31 December 2021, as disclosed in note 7 to the consolidated financial statements.

All of the Group's investment properties are measured using the fair value model based on a valuation performed by independent qualified professional valuers (the "Valuers"). As disclosed in notes 4 and 17 to the consolidated financial statements, in determining the fair value, the Valuers have applied a market value basis that involves, inter-alia, certain estimates, including comparable market transaction prices, development costs, appropriate capitalisation rates and discount rates and reversionary income potential.

# How our audit addressed the key audit matter

Our procedures in relation to valuation of investment properties as at date of transfer from property, plant and equipment and right-of-use assets, and as at year end date included:

- evaluating the competence, capabilities, and objectivity of the Valuers and obtaining an understanding of the Valuers' scope of work and their terms of engagement;
- involving our internal valuation expert to evaluate the appropriateness of the valuation methodology and the reasonableness of the key estimates such as comparable market transaction prices, development costs appropriate capitalisation rates and discount rates used in the valuation models, on sampling basis, based on market data and certain company specific parameters; and
- assessing the adequacy of the disclosures of the fair value measurement of investment properties including the fair value measurement hierarchy, the valuation technique and significant unobservable inputs in the consolidated financial statements.

#### 1. **GENERAL**

High Fashion International Limited (the "Company") is incorporated in Bermuda as an exempted company with limited liability and its shares are listed on The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited (the "Stock Exchange"). The addresses of the registered office and principal place of business of the Company are disclosed on page 159 to the annual report.

At 31 December 2021, Hinton Company Limited and High Fashion Charitable Foundation Limited, companies ultimately owned by Mr. Lam Foo Wah ("Mr. Lam"), the Chairman of the Company, and Mr. Lam, collectively own 71.04% of ordinary shares of the Company and collectively hold the same percentage of the voting rights of the Company. Accordingly, Mr. Lam is considered as the ultimate controlling party of the Company.

The functional currency of the Company is Renminbi ("RMB"), the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Company and its major subsidiaries operate. For the purpose of the preparation of consolidated financial statements and convenience of the financial statements users, the consolidated results and financial position of the Company and its subsidiaries (the "Group") are presented in Hong Kong dollars ("HK\$").

The Company acts as investment holding company. The principal activities of the Group are the manufacture, retailing and trading of garments, as well as property investment and development.

In particular, whether such costs should be limited to those that are incremental to the sale. The Committee concluded that the estimated costs necessary to make the sale should not be limited to those that are incremental but should also include costs that an entity must incur to sell its inventories including those that are not incremental to a particular sale.

The Group's accounting policy prior to the Committee's agenda decision was to determine the net realisable value of inventories taking into consideration incremental costs only. Upon application of the Committee's agenda decision, the Group changed its accounting policy to determine the net realisable value of inventories taking into consideration both incremental costs and other costs necessary to make the sale, including carriage outward charges in addition to incremental costs. The new accounting policy has been applied retrospectively.

The application of the Committee's agenda decision has had no material impact on the Group's financial positions and performance.

# Amendments to HKAS 1 and HKFRS Practice Statement 2 Disclosure of Accounting Policies

HKAS 1 is amended to replace all instances of the term "significant accounting policies" with "material accounting policy information". Accounting policy information is material if, when considered together with other information included in an entity's financial statements, it can reasonably be expected to influence decisions that the primary users of general purpose financial statements make on the basis of those financial statements.

The amendments also clarify that accounting policy information may be material because of the nature of the related transactions, other events or conditions, even if the amounts are immaterial. However, not all accounting policy information relating to material transactions, other events or conditions is itself material. If an entity chooses to disclose immaterial accounting policy information, such information must not obscure material accounting policy information.

HKFRS Practice Statement 2 *Making Materiality Judgements* (the "Practice Statement") is also amended to illustrate how an entity applies the "four-step materiality process" to accounting policy disclosures and to judge whether information about an accounting policy is material to its financial statements. Guidance and examples are added to the Practice Statement.

In such a case, an entity develops an accounting estimate to achieve the objective set out by the accounting policy. Developing accounting estimates involves the use of judgements or assumptions based on the latest available, reliable information.

In addition, the concept of changes in accounting estimates in HKAS 8 is retained with additional clarifications.

The application of the amendments is not expected to have significant impact on the Group's consolidated financial statements.

# Amendments to HKAS 12 Deferred Tax related to Assets and Liabilities arising from a Single Transaction

The amendments narrow the scope of the recognition exemption of deferred tax liabilities and deferred tax assets in paragraphs 15 and 24 of HKAS 12 Income Taxes ("HKAS 12") so that it no longer applies to transactions that, on initial recognition, give rise to equal taxable and deductible temporary differences.

As disclosed in note 3 to the consolidated financial statements, for leasing transactions in which the tax deductions are attributable to the lease liabilities, the Group applies HKAS 12 requirements to the relevant assets and liabilities as a whole. Temporary differences relating to relevant assets and liabilities are assessed on a net basis.

Upon the application of the amendments, the Group will recognise a deferred tax asset (to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary difference can be utilised) and a deferred tax liability for all deductible and taxable temporary differences associated with the right-of-use assets and the lease liabilities.

The amendments are effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2023, with early application permitted. As at 31 December 2021, the carrying amounts of right-of-use assets and lease liabilities which are subject to the amendments amounted to HK\$17,114,000 and HK\$18,410,000, respectively. The Group is in the process of assessing the full impact of the application of the amendments.

# 3. BASIS OF PREPARATION OF CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### Basis of preparation of consolidated financial statements

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with HKFRSs issued by the HKICPA. For the purpose of preparation of the consolidated financial statements, information is considered material if such information is reasonably expected to influence decisions made by primary users. In addition, the consolidated financial statements include applicable disclosures required by the Rules Governing the Listing of Securities on The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited ("Listing Rules") and by the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance.

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis except for certain properties and financial instruments that are measured at fair values at the end of each reporting period, as explained in the accounting policies set out below.

Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for goods and services.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date, regardless of whether that price is directly observable or estimated using another valuation technique. In estimating the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Group takes into account the characteristics of the asset or liability if market participants would take those characteristics into account when pricing the asset or liability at the measurement date. Fair value for measurement and/or disclosure purposes in these consolidated financial statements is determined on such a basis, except for share-based payment transactions that are within the scope of HKFRS 2 Share-based Payment, leasing transactions that are accounted for in accordance with HKFRS 16 Leases ("HKFRS 16"), and measurements that have some similarities to fair value but are not fair value, such as net realisable value in HKAS 2 Inventories or value in use in HKAS 36 Impairment of Assets ("HKAS 36").

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use.

In addition, for financial reporting purposes, fair value measurements are categorised into Level 1, 2 or 3 based on the degree to which the inputs to the fair value measurements are observable and the significance of the inputs to the fair value measurement in its entirety, which are described as follows:

- Level 1 inputs are quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the entity can access at the measurement date;
- Level 2 inputs are inputs, other than quoted prices included within Level 1, that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly; and
- Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability.

## Significant accounting policies

#### Basis of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the financial statements of the Company and entities controlled by the Company and its subsidiaries. Control is achieved when the Company:

- has power over the investee;
- is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee; and
- has the ability to use its power to affect its returns.

The Group reassesses whether or not it controls an investee if facts and circumstances indicate that there are changes to one or more of the three elements of control listed above.

Consolidation of a subsidiary begins when the Group obtains control over the subsidiary and ceases when the Group loses control of the subsidiary. Specifically, income and expenses of a subsidiary acquired or disposed of during the year are included in the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income from the date the Group gains control until the date when the Group ceases to control the subsidiary.

Profit or loss and each item of other comprehensive income are attributed to the owners of the Company and to the non-controlling interests. Total comprehensive income of subsidiaries is attributed to the owners of the Company and to the non-controlling interests even if this results in the non-controlling interests having a deficit balance.

When necessary, adjustments are made to the financial statements of subsidiaries to bring their accounting policies in line with the Group's accounting policies.

All intragroup assets and liabilities, equity, income, expenses and cash flows relating to transactions between members of the Group are eliminated in full on consolidation.

Non-controlling interests in subsidiaries are presented separately from the Group's equity therein, which represent present ownership interests entitling their holders to a proportionate share of net assets of the relevant subsidiaries upon liquidation.

### Investments in joint ventures

A joint venture is a joint arrangement whereby the parties that have joint control of the arrangement have rights to the net assets of the joint arrangement. Joint control is the contractually agreed sharing of control of an arrangement, which exists only when decisions about the relevant activities require unanimous consent of the parties sharing control.

### Investments in joint ventures (Cont'd)

The results and assets and liabilities of joint ventures are incorporated in these consolidated financial statements using the equity method of accounting. The financial statements of joint ventures used for equity accounting purposes are prepared using uniform accounting policies as those of the Group for like transactions and events in similar circumstances. Under the equity method, an investment in a joint venture is initially recognised in the consolidated statement of financial position at cost and adjusted thereafter to recognise the Group's share of the profit or loss and other comprehensive income of the joint venture. Changes in net assets of the joint venture other than profit or loss and other comprehensive income are not accounted for unless such changes resulted in changes in ownership interest held by the Group. When the Group's share of losses of a joint venture exceeds the Group's interest in that joint venture (which includes any long-term interests that, in substance, form part of the Group's net investment in the joint venture), the Group discontinues recognising its share of further losses. Additional losses are recognised only to the extent that the Group has incurred legal or constructive obligations or made payments on behalf of the joint venture.

An investment in a joint venture is accounted for using the equity method from the date on which the investee becomes a joint venture. On acquisition of the investment in a joint venture, any excess of the cost of the investment over the Group's share of the net fair value of the identifiable assets and liabilities of the investee is recognised as goodwill, which is included within the carrying amount of the investment. Any excess of the Group's share of the net fair value of the identifiable assets and liabilities over the cost of the investment, after reassessment, is recognised immediately in profit or loss in the period in which the investment is acquired.

The Group assesses whether there is an objective evidence that the interest in a joint venture may be impaired. When any objective evidence exists, the entire carrying amount of the investment (including goodwill) is tested for impairment in accordance with HKAS 36 as a single asset by comparing its recoverable amount (higher of value in use and fair value less costs of disposal) with its carrying amount. Any impairment loss recognised is not allocated to any asset, including goodwill, that forms part of the carrying amount of the investment. Any reversal of that impairment loss is recognised in accordance with HKAS 36 to the extent that the recoverable amount of the investment subsequently increases.

When a group entity transacts with a joint venture of the Group, profits and losses resulting from the transactions with the joint venture are recognised in the Group's consolidated financial statements only to the extent of interests in the joint venture that are not related to the Group.

### Revenue from contracts with customers

The Group recognises revenue when (or as) a performance obligation is satisfied, i.e. when "control" of the goods or services underlying the particular performance obligation is transferred to the customer.

# Revenue from contracts with customers (Cont'd)

A performance obligation represents a good or service (or a bundle of goods or services) that is distinct or a series of distinct goods or services that are substantially the same.

Control is transferred over time and revenue is recognised over time by reference to the progress towards complete satisfaction of the relevant performance obligation if one of the following criteria is met:

- the customer simultaneously receives and consumes the benefits provided by the Group's performance as the Group performs;
- the Group's performance creates or enhances an asset that the customer controls as the Group performs; or
- the Group's performance does not create an asset with an alternative use to the Group and the Group has an enforceable right to payment for performance completed to date.

Otherwise, revenue is recognised at a point in time when the customer obtains control of the distinct good or service.

A contract liability represents the Group's obligation to transfer goods or services to a customer for which the Group has received consideration (or an amount of consideration is due) from the customer.

# Variable consideration

The Group sells brand garments to retail customers who can return the goods for refund. These contracts contain variable consideration. The Group estimates the amount of consideration to which it will be entitled using the expected value method.

The estimated amount of variable consideration is included in the transaction price only to the extent that it is highly probable that such an inclusion will not result in a significant revenue reversal in the future when the uncertainty associated with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved.

At the end of each reporting period, the Group updates the estimated transaction price (including updating its assessment of whether an estimate of variable consideration is constrained) to represent faithfully the circumstances present at the end of the reporting period and the changes in circumstances during the reporting period.

### Leasing

### Definition of a lease

A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

For contracts entered into or modified or after the date of initial application of HKFRS 16 or arising from business combinations, the Group assesses whether a contract is or contains a lease based on the definition under HKFRS 16 at inception, modification date or acquisition date, as appropriate. Such contract will not be reassessed unless the terms and conditions of the contract are subsequently changed.

### The Group as a lessee

#### Short-term leases

The Group applies the short-term lease recognition exemption to leases of properties and office equipment that have a lease term of 12 months or less from the commencement date and do not contain a purchase option. Lease payments on short-term leases and leases of low-value assets are recognised as expense on a straight-line basis or another systematic basis over the lease term.

### Right-of-use assets

The cost of right-of-use asset includes:

- the amount of the initial measurement of the lease liability;
- any lease payments made at or before the commencement date, less any lease incentives received; and
- any initial direct costs incurred by the Group.

Except for those that are classified as investment properties and measured under fair value model, right-of-use assets are measured at cost, less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, and adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities.

Right-of-use assets in which the Group is reasonably certain to obtain ownership of the underlying leased assets at the end of the lease term are depreciated from commencement date to the end of the useful life. Otherwise, right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of its estimated useful life and the lease term.

The Group presents right-of-use assets that do not meet the definition of investment property or inventory as a separate line item on the consolidated statement of financial position. Right-of-use assets that meet the definition of investment property and inventory are presented within "investment properties" and "properties held for sale" respectively.

Refundable rental deposits

Refundable rental deposits paid are accounted under HKFRS 9 Financial Instruments ("HKFRS 9") and initially measured at fair value. Adjustments to fair value at initial recognition are considered as additional lease payments and included in the cost of right-of-use assets.

#### Lease liabilities

At the commencement date of a lease, the Group recognises and measures the lease liability at the present value of lease payments that are unpaid at that date. In calculating the present value of lease payments, the Group uses the incremental borrowing rate at the lease commencement date if the interest rate implicit in the lease is not readily determinable.

The lease payments include fixed payments (including in-substance fixed payments) less any lease incentives receivable.

Variable lease payments that do not depend on an index or a rate are not included in the measurement of lease liabilities and right-of-use assets, and are recognised as expense in the period in which the event or condition that triggers the payment occurs.

After the commencement date, lease liabilities are adjusted by interest accretion and lease payments.

The Group remeasures lease liabilities (and makes a corresponding adjustment to the related right-of-use assets) whenever the lease term has changed, in which case the related lease liability is remeasured by discounting the revised lease payments using a revised discount rate at the date of reassessment.

The Group presents lease liabilities as a separate line item on the consolidated statement of financial position.

Lease modifications

The Group accounts for a lease modification as a separate lease if:

- the modification increases the scope of the lease by adding the right to use one or more underlying assets; and
- the consideration for the leases increases by an amount commensurate with the stand-alone price for the increase in scope and any appropriate adjustments to that stand-alone price to reflect the circumstances of the particular contract.

For a lease modification that is not accounted for as a separate lease, the Group remeasures the lease liability, less any lease incentives receivable, based on the lease term of the modified lease by discounting the revised lease payments using a revised discount rate at the effective date of the modification.

The Group accounts for the remeasurement of lease liabilities by making corresponding adjustments to the relevant right-of-use asset.

### The Group as a lessor

Rental income from operating leases is recognised in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the term of the relevant lease and is presented in "Revenue" on the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income when it is derived from the Group's ordinary course of business.

### Allocation of consideration to components of a contract

When a contract includes both leases and non-lease components, the Group applies HKFRS 15 Revenue from Contract with Customers ("HKFRS 15") to allocate consideration in a contract to lease and non-lease components. Non-lease components are separated from lease component on the basis of their relative stand-alone selling prices.

### Refundable rental deposits

Refundable rental deposits received are accounted for under HKFRS 9 and initially measured at fair value. Adjustments to fair value at initial recognition are considered as additional lease payments from lessees.

Lease modification

Changes in considerations of lease contracts that were not part of the original terms and conditions are accounted for as lease modifications, including lease incentives provided through forgiveness or reduction of rentals.

The Group accounts for a modification to an operating lease as a new lease from the effective date of the modification, considering any prepaid or accrued lease payments relating to the original lease as part of the lease payments for the new lease.

#### Foreign currencies

In preparing the financial statements of each individual group entity, transactions in currencies other than the functional currency of that entity (foreign currencies) are recognised at the rates of exchanges prevailing on the dates of the transactions. At the end of the reporting period, monetary items denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing at that date. Non-monetary items carried at fair value that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing on the date when the fair value was determined. Nonmonetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are not retranslated.

Exchange differences arising on the settlement of monetary items, and on the retranslation of monetary items, are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise, except for exchange differences on monetary items receivable from or payable to a foreign operation for which settlement is neither planned nor likely to occur (therefore forming part of the net investment in the foreign operation), which are recognised initially in other comprehensive income and reclassified from equity to profit or loss on disposal or partial disposal of the Group's interests in joint ventures.

For the purposes of presenting the consolidated financial statements, the assets and liabilities of the Group's foreign operations are translated into the presentation currency of the Group (i.e. HK\$) using exchange rate prevailing at the end of each reporting period. Income and expenses items are translated at the average exchange rates for the period, unless exchange rates fluctuate significantly during that period, in which case the exchange rates at the date of transactions are used. Exchange differences arising, if any, are recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in equity under the heading of "translation reserve" (attributed to noncontrolling interests as appropriate).

Exchange differences relating to the retranslation of the Group's net assets in RMB to the Group's presentation currency (i.e. HK\$) are recognised directly in other comprehensive income and accumulated in the translation reserve. Such exchange differences accumulated in the translation reserve are not reclassified to profit or loss subsequently.

#### Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets, which are assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale, are added to the cost of those assets until such time as the assets are substantially ready for their intended use or sale.

Any specific borrowing that remains outstanding after the related assets is ready for its intended use or sale is included in the general borrowing pool for calculation of capitalization rate on general borrowings. Investment income earned on the temporary investment of specific borrowings pending their expenditure on qualifying assets is deducted from the borrowing costs eligible for capitalisation.

All other borrowing costs are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they are incurred.

#### Retirement benefit costs

Payments to the Mandatory Provident Fund Schemes and state-managed retirement benefit schemes are recognised as an expense when employees have rendered service entitling them to the contributions.

Short-term employee benefits are recognised at the undiscounted amount of the benefits expected to be paid as and when employees rendered the services. All short-term employee benefits are recognised as an expense unless another HKFRS requires or permits the inclusion of the benefit in the cost of an asset.

A liability is recognised for benefits accruing to employees (such as wages and salaries and annual leave) after deducting any amount already paid.

Liabilities recognised in respect of other long-term employee benefits are measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows expected to be made by the Group in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date. Any changes in the liabilities' carrying amounts resulting from service cost, interest and remeasurements are recognised in profit or loss except to the extent that another HKFRS requires or permits their inclusion in the cost of an asset.

#### Equity-settled share-based payment transactions

Equity-settled share-based payments to employees and others providing similar services are measured at the fair value of the equity instruments at the grant date.

Equity-settled share-based payments to employees and others providing similar services are measured at the fair value of the equity instruments at the grant date.

The fair value of the equity-settled share-based payments determined at the grant date without taking into consideration all non-market vesting conditions is expensed on a straight-line basis over the vesting period, based on the Group's estimate of equity instruments that will eventually vest, with a corresponding increase in equity (share options reserve). At the end of each reporting period, the Group revises its estimate of the number of equity instruments expected to vest based on assessment of all relevant non-market vesting conditions. The impact of the revision of the original estimates, if any, is recognised in profit or loss such that the cumulative expense reflects the revised estimate, with a corresponding adjustment to the share options reserve.

When share options are exercised, the amount previously recognised in share options reserve will be transferred to share premium. When the share options are forfeited after the vesting date or are still not exercised at the expiry date, the amount previously recognised in share options reserve will be transferred to retained profits.

#### **Taxation**

Income tax expense represents the sum of the tax currently payable and deferred tax.

The tax currently payable is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from profit before taxation because of income or expense that are taxable or deductible in other years and items that are never taxable or deductible. The Group's liability for current tax is calculated using tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

Deferred tax is recognised on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the consolidated financial statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profits. Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognised for all taxable temporary differences. Deferred tax assets are generally recognised for all deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which those deductible temporary differences can be utilised. Such deferred tax assets and liabilities are not recognised if the temporary difference arises from the initial recognition (other than in a business combination) of assets and liabilities in a transaction that affects neither the taxable profit nor the accounting profit.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for taxable temporary differences associated with investments in subsidiaries and interests in joint ventures, except where the Group is able to control the reversal of the temporary difference and it is probable that the temporary difference will not reverse in the foreseeable future. Deferred tax assets arising from deductible temporary differences associated with such investments and interests are only recognised to the extent that it is probable that there will be sufficient taxable profits against which to utilise the benefits of the temporary differences and they are expected to reverse in the foreseeable future.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at the end of each reporting period and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available to allow all or part of the assets to be recovered.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period in which the liability is settled or the asset is realised, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

The measurement of deferred tax liabilities and assets reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Group expects, at the end of the reporting period, to recover or settle the carrying amounts of its assets and liabilities.

For the purposes of measuring deferred tax for investment properties that are measured using the fair value model, the carrying amounts of such properties are presumed to be recovered entirely through sale, unless the presumption is rebutted. The presumption is rebutted when the investment property is depreciable and is held within a business model whose objective is to consume substantially all of the economic benefits embodied in the investment property over time, rather than through sale.

For the purposes of measuring deferred tax for leasing transactions in which the Group recognises the right-of-use assets and the related lease liabilities, the Group first determines whether the tax deductions are attributable to the right-of-use assets or the lease liabilities.

For leasing transactions in which the tax deductions are attributable to the lease liabilities, the Group applies HKAS 12 requirements to the leasing transaction as a whole. Temporary differences relating to right-of-use assets and lease liabilities are assessed on a net basis. Excess of depreciation on right-of-use assets over the lease payments for the principal portion of lease liabilities resulting in net deductible temporary differences.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset when there is a legally enforceable right to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and when they relate to income taxes levied to the same taxable entity by the same taxation authority.

Current and deferred tax are recognised in profit or loss, except when they relate to items that are recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, in which case, the current and deferred tax are also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively.

In assessing any uncertainty over income tax treatments, the Group considers whether it is probable that the relevant tax authority will accept the uncertain tax treatment used, or proposed to be use by individual group entities in their income tax filings. If it is probable, the current and deferred taxes are determined consistently with the tax treatment in the income tax filings. If it is not probable that the relevant taxation authority will accept an uncertain tax treatment, the effect of each uncertainty is reflected by using either the most likely amount or the expected value.

#### Government grants

Government grants are not recognised until there is reasonable assurance that the Group will comply with the conditions attaching to them and that the grants will be received.

Government grants are recognised in profit or loss on a systematic basis over the periods in which the Group recognises as expenses the related costs for which the grants are intended to compensate. Specifically, government grants whose primary condition is that the Group should purchase, construct or otherwise acquire non-current assets are recognised as a deduction from the carrying amount of the relevant asset in the consolidated statement of financial position and transferred to profit or loss on a systematic and rational basis over the useful lives of the related assets.

Government grants related to income that are receivable as compensation for expenses or losses already incurred or for the purpose of giving immediate financial support to the Group with no future related costs are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they become receivable. Such grants are presented under "other income".

### Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are tangible assets that are held for use in the production or supply of goods or services, or for administrative purposes (other than properties under construction as described below). Property, plant and equipment are stated in the consolidated statement of financial position at cost less subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses, if any.

Properties in the course of construction for production, supply or administrative purposes are carried at cost, less any recognised impairment loss. Costs include any costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management and, for qualifying assets, borrowing costs capitalised in accordance with the Group's accounting policy. Depreciation of these assets, on the same basis as other property assets, commences when the assets are ready for their intended use.

When the Group makes payments for ownership interests of properties which includes both leasehold land and building elements, the entire consideration is allocated between the leasehold land and the building elements in proportion to the relative fair values at initial recognition.

To the extent the allocation of the relevant payments can be made reliably, interest in leasehold land that is accounted for as an operating lease is presented as "right-of-use assets" in the consolidated statement of financial position except for those that are classified and accounted for as investment properties under the fair value model.

If a property becomes an investment property because its use has changed as evidenced by end of owneroccupation, any difference between the carrying amount and the fair value of that item (including the relevant leasehold land classified as right-of-use assets) at the date of transfer is recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in property revaluation reserve. On the subsequent sale or retirement of the asset, the relevant revaluation reserve will be transferred directly to retained profits.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost of assets (other than construction in progress) less their residual values over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method. The estimated useful lives, residual values and depreciation method are reviewed at the end of each reporting period, with the effect of any changes in estimate accounted for on a prospective basis.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected to arise from the continued use of the asset. Any gain or loss arising on the disposal or retirement of an item of property, plant and equipment is determined as the difference between the sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognised in profit or loss.

#### Investment properties

Investment properties are properties held to earn rentals and/or for capital appreciation (including properties under construction for such purposes).

Investment properties are initially measured at cost, including any directly attributable expenditure. Subsequent to initial recognition, investment properties are measured at their fair values, adjusted to exclude any prepaid or accrued operating lease income.

Gains or losses arising from changes in the fair value of investment properties are included in profit or loss for the period in which they arise.

Construction costs incurred for investment properties under construction are capitalised as part of the carrying amount of the investment properties under construction.

An investment property is derecognised upon disposal or when the investment property is permanently withdrawn from use and no future economic benefits are expected from its disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the property (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in the profit or loss in the period in which the property is derecognised.

Internally-generated intangible assets - research and development expenditure

Expenditure on research activities is recognised as an expense in the period in which it is incurred.

An internally-generated intangible asset arising from development activities (or from the development phase of an internal project) is recognised if, and only if, all of the following have been demonstrated:

- the technical feasibility of completing the intangible asset so that it will be available for use or sale;
- the intention to complete the intangible asset and use or sell it;
- the ability to use or sell the intangible asset;
- how the intangible asset will generate probable future economic benefits;
- the availability of adequate technical, financial and other resources to complete the development and to use or sell the intangible asset; and
- the ability to measure reliably the expenditure attributable to the intangible asset during its development.

The amount initially recognised for internally-generated intangible asset is the sum of the expenditure incurred from the date when the intangible asset first meets the recognition criteria listed above. Where no internally-generated intangible asset can be recognised, development expenditure is charged to profit or loss in the period in which it is incurred.

Subsequent to initial recognition, internally-generated intangible assets are reported at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses (if any), on the same basis the intangible assets that are acquired separately.

Impairment losses on property, plant and equipment, right-of-use assets and intangible assets

At the end of the reporting period, the Group reviews the carrying amounts of its property, plant and equipment, right-of-use assets and intangible assets with finite useful lives to determine whether there is any indication that these assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the relevant asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any). Intangible assets not yet available for use are tested for impairment at least annually, and whenever there is an indication that they may be impaired.

The recoverable amount of property, plant and equipment, right-of-use assets and intangible assets are estimated individually. When it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount individually, the Group estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

In testing a cash-generating unit for impairment, corporate assets are allocated to the relevant cash-generating unit when a reasonable and consistent basis of allocation can be established, or otherwise they are allocated to the smallest group of cash generating units for which a reasonable and consistent allocation basis can be established. The recoverable amount is determined for the cash-generating unit or group of cash-generating units to which the corporate asset belongs, and is compared with the carrying amount of the relevant cash-generating unit or group of cash-generating units.

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs of disposal and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset (or a cash-generating unit) for which the estimates of future cash flows have not been adjusted.

If the recoverable amount of an asset (or a cash-generating unit) is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset (or a cash-generating unit) is reduced to its recoverable amount. For corporate assets or portion of corporate assets which cannot be allocated on a reasonable and consistent basis to a cash-generating unit, the Group compares the carrying amount of a group of cash-generating units, including the carrying amounts of the corporate assets or portion of corporate assets allocated to that group of cash-generating units, with the recoverable amount of the group of cash-generating units. In allocating the impairment loss, the impairment loss is allocated first to reduce the carrying amount of any goodwill (if applicable) and then to the other assets on a pro-rata basis based on the carrying amount of each asset in the unit or the group of cash-generating units. The carrying amount of an asset is not reduced below the highest of its fair value less costs of disposal (if measurable), its value in use (if determinable) and zero. The amount of the impairment loss that would otherwise have been allocated to the asset is allocated pro rata to the other assets of the unit or the group of cash-generating units. An impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (or a cash-generating unit or a group of cash-generating units) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (or a cash-generating unit or a group of cash-generating units) in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

#### Provisions and contingent liabilities

Provisions are recognised when the Group has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that the Group will be required to settle that obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognised as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. When a provision is measured using the cash flows estimated to settle the present obligation, its carrying amount is the present value of those cash flows (where the effect of the time value of money is material).

Contingent liability is a present obligation that arises from past events but is not recognised because it is not probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation.

#### Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Costs of inventories are determined on a weighted average method. Net realisable value represents the estimated selling price for inventories less all estimated costs of completion and costs necessary to make the sale. Costs necessary to make the sale include incremental costs directly attributable to the sale and non-incremental costs which the Group must incur to make the sale.

#### Properties held for sale

Properties for/under development which are intended to be sold upon completion of development and properties for sale are classified as current assets. Except for the leasehold land element which is measured at cost model in accordance with the accounting policies of right-of-use assets, properties for/under development/properties for sale are carried at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is determined on a specific identification basis including allocation of the related development expenditure incurred and where appropriate, borrowing costs capitalised. Net realisable value represents the estimated selling price for the properties less estimated cost to completion and costs necessary to make the sales. Costs necessary to make the sale include incremental costs directly attributable to the sale and non-incremental costs which the Group must incur to make the sale.

#### Financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when a group entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. All regular way purchases or sales of financial assets are recognised and derecognised on a trade date basis. Regular way purchases or sales are purchases or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within the time frame established by regulation or convention in the market place.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value except for trade receivables arising from contracts with customers which are initially measured in accordance with HKFRS 15. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than financial assets or financial liabilities at FVTPL) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition. Transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets or financial liabilities at FVTPL are recognised immediately in profit or loss.

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset or financial liability and of allocating interest income and interest expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts and payments (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial asset or financial liability, or, where appropriate, a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

#### Classification and subsequent measurement of financial assets

Financial assets that meet the following conditions are subsequently measured at amortised cost:

- · the financial asset is held within a business model whose objective is to collect contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Financial assets that meet the following conditions are subsequently measured at FVTOCI:

- the financial asset is held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both selling and collecting contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

All other financial assets are subsequently measured at FVTPL, except that at the date of initial recognition of a financial asset the Group may irrevocably elect to present subsequent changes in fair value of an equity investment in other comprehensive income if that equity investment is neither held for trading nor contingent consideration recognised by an acquirer in a business combination to which HKFRS 3 "Business Combinations" applies.

#### Amortised cost and interest income

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method for financial assets measured subsequently at amortised cost. Interest income is calculated by applying the effective interest rate to the gross carrying amount of a financial asset, except for financial assets that have subsequently become credit-impaired (see below). For financial assets that have subsequently become credit-impaired, interest income is recognised by applying the effective interest rate to the amortised cost of the financial asset from the next reporting period. If the credit risk on the credit-impaired financial instrument improves so that the financial asset is no longer credit-impaired, interest income is recognised by applying the effective interest rate to the gross carrying amount of the financial asset from the beginning of the reporting period following the determination that the asset is no longer credit impaired.

#### Equity instruments designated as at FVTOCI (ii)

Investments in equity instruments at FVTOCI are subsequently measured at fair value with gains and losses arising from changes in fair value recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in the investment revaluation reserve; and are not subject to impairment assessment. The cumulative gain or loss will not be reclassified to profit or loss on disposal of the equity investments, and will be transferred to retained profits.

Dividends from these investments in equity instruments are recognised in profit or loss when the Group's right to receive the dividends is established, unless the dividends clearly represent a recovery of part of the cost of the investment. Dividends are included in the "other income" line item in profit or loss.

The net gain or loss recognised in profit or loss includes any dividend or interest earned on the financial asset and is included in the "other gains and losses" line item.

The Group performs impairment assessment under expected credit loss ("ECL") model on financial assets (including trade receivables, deposits and other receivables, amounts due from joint ventures, short-term bank deposits and bank balances) and lease receivables which are subject to impairment assessment under HKFRS 9. The amount of ECL is updated at each reporting date to reflect changes in credit risk since initial recognition.

Lifetime ECL represents the ECL that will result from all possible default events over the expected life of the relevant instrument. In contrast, 12-month ECL ("12m ECL") represents the portion of lifetime ECL that is expected to result from default events that are possible within 12 months after the reporting date. Assessment are done based on the Group's historical credit loss experience, adjusted for factors that are specific to the debtors, general economic conditions and an assessment of both the current conditions at the reporting date as well as the forecast of future conditions.

The Group always recognises lifetime ECL for trade and lease receivables. The ECL on trade and lease receivables are assessed individually.

For all other instruments, the Group measures the loss allowance equal to 12m ECL, unless when there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, in which case the Group recognises lifetime ECL. The assessment of whether lifetime ECL should be recognised is based on significant increases in the likelihood or risk of a default occurring since initial recognition.

Significant increase in credit risk

In assessing whether the credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition, the Group compares the risk of a default occurring on the financial instrument as at the reporting date with the risk of a default occurring on the financial instrument as at the date of initial recognition. In making this assessment, the Group considers both quantitative and qualitative information that is reasonable and supportable, including historical experience and forward-looking information that is available without undue cost or effort.

In particular, the following information is taken into account when assessing whether credit risk has increased significantly:

- an actual or expected significant deterioration in the financial instrument's external (if available) or internal credit rating;
- significant deterioration in external market indicators of credit risk, e.g. a significant increase in the credit spread, the credit default swap prices for the debtor;
- existing or forecast adverse changes in business, financial or economic conditions that are expected to cause a significant decrease in the debtor's ability to meet its debt obligations;
- an actual or expected significant deterioration in the operating results of the debtor;
- an actual or expected significant adverse change in the regulatory, economic, or technological environment of the debtor that results in a significant decrease in the debtor's ability to meet its debt obligations.

Irrespective of the outcome of the above assessment, the Group presumes that the credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition when contractual payments are more than 30 days past due, unless the Group has reasonable and supportable information that demonstrates otherwise.

The Group regularly monitors the effectiveness of the criteria used to identify whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk and revises them as appropriate to ensure that the criteria are capable of identifying significant increase in credit risk before the amount becomes past due.

#### (ii) Definition of default

For internal credit risk management, the Group considers an event of default occurs when information developed internally or obtained from external sources indicates that the debtor is unlikely to pay its creditors, including the Group, in full (without taking into account any collaterals held by the Group).

Irrespective of the above, the Group considers that default has occurred when a financial asset is more than 90 days past due unless the Group has reasonable and supportable information to demonstrate that a more lagging default criterion is more appropriate.

#### (iii) Credit-impaired financial assets

A financial asset is credit-impaired when one or more events of default that have a detrimental impact on the estimated future cash flows of that financial asset have occurred. Evidence that a financial asset is credit-impaired includes observable data about the following events:

- significant financial difficulty of the issuer or the borrower;
- a breach of contract, such as a default or past due event;
- the lender(s) of the borrower, for economic or contractual reasons relating to the borrower's financial difficulty, having granted to the borrower a concession(s) that the lender(s) would not otherwise consider; or
- it is becoming probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation.

#### (iv) Write-off policy

The Group writes off a financial asset when there is information indicating that the counterparty is in severe financial difficulty and there is no realistic prospect of recovery, for example, when the counterparty has been placed under liquidation or has entered into bankruptcy proceedings, or in the case of trade receivables, when the amounts are over two years past due, whichever occurs sooner. Financial assets written off may still be subject to enforcement activities under the Group's recovery procedures, taking into account legal advice where appropriate. A write-off constitutes a derecognition event. Any subsequent recoveries are recognised in profit or loss.

### Measurement and recognition of ECL

The measurement of ECL is a function of the probability of default, loss given default (i.e. the magnitude of the loss if there is a default) and the exposure at default. The assessment of the probability of default and loss given default is based on historical data and forward-looking information. Estimation of ECL reflects an unbiased and probability-weighted amount that is determined with the respective risks of default occurring as the weights.

Generally, the ECL is the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due to the Group in accordance with the contract and the cash flows that the Group expects to receive, discounted at the effective interest rate determined at initial recognition. For a lease receivable, the cash flows used for determining the ECL is consistent with the cash flows used in measuring the lease receivable in accordance with HKFRS 16.

Interest income is calculated based on the gross carrying amount of the financial asset unless the financial asset is credit impaired, in which case interest income is calculated based on amortised cost of the financial asset.

The Group recognises an impairment gain or loss in profit or loss for all financial instruments by adjusting their carrying amount, with the exception of trade receivables, where the corresponding adjustment is recognised through a loss allowance account.

### Derecognition of financial assets

The Group derecognises a financial asset only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or when it transfers the financial asset and substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset to another entity. If the Group retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of a transferred financial asset, the Group continues to recognise the financial asset and also recognises a collateralised borrowing for the proceeds received.

On derecognition of a financial asset measured at amortised cost, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable is recognised in profit or loss.

On derecognition of an investment in equity instrument which the Group has elected on initial recognition to measure at FVTOCI, the cumulative gain or loss previously accumulated in the FVTOCI reserve is not reclassified to profit or loss, but is transferred to retained profits.

Classification as debt or equity

Debt and equity instruments are classified as either financial liabilities or as equity in accordance with the substance of the contractual arrangements and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument.

#### Equity instruments

An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of an entity after deducting all of its liabilities. Equity instruments issued by the Company are recognised at the proceeds received, net of direct issue costs.

#### Financial liabilities at amortised cost

Financial liabilities including trade payables, other payables, amount due to an associate and bank borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost, using the effective interest method.

### Derecognition of financial liabilities

The Group derecognises financial liabilities when, and only when, the Group's obligations are discharged, cancelled or have expired. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid and payable is recognised in profit or loss.

#### Derivative financial instruments

Derivatives are initially recognised at fair value at the date when derivative contracts are entered into and are subsequently remeasured to their fair value at the end of the reporting period. The resulting gain or loss is recognised in profit or loss immediately.

#### CRITICAL ACCOUNTING JUDGMENTS AND KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION 4. **UNCERTAINTY**

In the application of the Group's accounting policies, which are described in note 3, the directors of the Company are required to make judgments, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and underlying assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an on-going basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

#### Critical judgments in applying accounting policies

The following are the critical judgments, apart from those involving estimations (see below), that the directors of the Company have made in the process of applying the Group's accounting policies and that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the consolidated financial statements.

#### Revenue recognition from sale of garments with no alternative use

Under HKFRS 15.35(c), control of an asset is transferred over time when the Group's performance does not create an asset with an alternative use to the Group and the Group has an enforceable right to payment for performance completed to date, or otherwise at a point in time upon customer obtains control of that asset. Significant judgment is required in determining whether the terms of the Group's contracts with customers create an enforceable right to payment for the Group. The Group has considered the contractual terms with the relevant customers, the laws that apply to the relevant contracts for sale of garments with no alternative use and the opinion from external legal counsel. Based on the assessment of the directors of the Company, the terms of these sales contracts do not create an enforceable right to payment to the Group, and accordingly, sale of garments with no alternative use is considered to be performance obligation satisfied at a point in time.

### Deferred taxation on investment properties

For the purposes of measuring deferred taxes arising from investment properties that are measured using the fair value model, the directors of the Company have reviewed the Group's investment property portfolio and concluded that the Group's investment properties are held under a business model whose objective is to consume substantially all of the economic benefits embodied in the investment properties over time, rather than through sale. Therefore, in determining the Group's deferred taxation on investment properties, the directors of the Company have determined that the presumption that the carrying amounts of investment properties measured using the fair value model are recovered entirely through sale is rebutted. As a result, the Group has recognised deferred taxes on changes in fair value of investment properties during the year to reflect the tax consequences through consuming the inherent economic benefits through use.

#### Key sources of estimation uncertainty

The followings are the key assumptions concerning the future, and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the reporting period, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.

### Fair value of investment properties

Investment properties are stated at fair value based on the valuation performed by independent professional valuers. The determination of the fair value involves, inter-alia, certain estimates including comparable market transaction prices, development costs, appropriate capitalisation rates and discount rates and reversionary potential, which are set out in note 17.

In relying on the valuation report, the directors of the Company have exercised their judgement and are satisfied that the method of valuation is reflective of the current market conditions. Whilst the Group considers valuations of the Group's investment properties are the best estimates, changes to these assumptions would result in changes in the fair values of the Group's investment properties and the corresponding adjustments to the amount of gain or loss reported in the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

As at 31 December 2021, the carrying amount of the Group's investment properties is HK\$3,101,216,000 (2020: HK\$2,630,916,000).

#### Provision in respect of the ongoing enquiry of customs duty

Provision is recognised when the Group has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that the Group will be required to settle that obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. As disclosed in note 21(b), the Group has an ongoing enquiry by the customs authority in Shaoxing City of Zhejiang Province in the Mainland China in relation to customs duty for import of certain machinery parts and apparel accessories for manufacturing by the Mainland China factories into China. Notwithstanding the judgments made by the court, the Group's legal professionals in the Mainland China advised that the evidence relied upon by the court is not factually supported. Based on the legal advice, management of the Group determined it is not probable that the Group will be required to settle penalty and unpaid customs stated in the court judgments. At 31 December 2021, the Group made a provision for penalty for not complying the processing trade requirement of RMB2,000,000 (equivalent to approximately HK\$2,371,000) (Note 21(b)).

#### Provision of ECL for trade receivables

The debtors which are not credit-impaired are grouped by internal credit rating and assessed collectively. Debtors which are credit impaired are assessed individually. The provision rates are based on the Group's historical default rates and forward-looking information that is reasonable, supportable and available without undue cost or effort. At each reporting date, the historical observed default rates are reassessed and changes in the forward-looking information are considered.

The provision of ECL is sensitive to changes in estimates. The information about the ECL and the Group's trade receivables is disclosed in note 41.

### Performance obligations for contracts with customers

#### Manufacturing and trading of garments

Contracts with customers within the Group's manufacturing and trading business include promises to sell garments, fabrics and accessories. Significant judgment is required in determining the timing of revenue recognition in accordance with HKFRS 15.35(c) on whether the terms of the Group's contracts with customers create an enforceable right to payment for the Group. The Group has considered the contractual terms with the relevant customers, the laws that apply to the relevant contracts for sale of garments with no alternative use and the opinion from external legal counsel. Based on the assessment of the directors of the Company, the terms of these sales contracts do not create an enforceable right to payment to the Group, and accordingly, revenue associated with the sale of products are recognised at the point in time when control of the promised goods has been transferred to the customers. The point in time when control transfers to the customer depends on the contractually agreed upon shipping terms, but typically occurs once the product has been shipped or once it has been delivered to a location specified by the customers. Transportation and handling activities that occur before the customers obtain control over the relevant goods are considered as fulfilment activities.

Certain contracts, primarily those for sale of tailor-made products, require upfront customer deposits that result in a contract liability. Upfront deposits or prepayments are usually invoiced upon acceptance of sales orders for certain customers. Revenue is recognised when the products have been shipped to the customer's specific location (delivery) as specified in the customer contract. Upon delivery, customers are granted credit terms which generally range from 30 to 90 days from the invoice date, which approximates the respective revenue recognition dates. Such terms are common within the industries in which the Group is associated and are not considered financing arrangements.

## Sale of brand garments (retail business)

Revenue within the Group's retail business is recognised when the customer takes physical possession of the products, which occurs at the point of sale for merchandise purchased at the Group's retail stores. Customers are allowed to return the goods for refund within 7 days after the respective sales take place. Revenue is recognised at an expected value of the transaction price adjusted for estimated returns based on historical trends. Payment is due at the point of sale. The payments settled by credit cards or mobile payment by customers are normally received within one to two days from the transaction date.

#### Sale of properties

For contracts entered into with customers on sale of properties, the relevant properties specified in the contracts are based on customer's specifications with no alternative use. On 21 March 2018, the Hong Kong Legislative Council passed The Inland Revenue (Amendment) (No. 7) Bill 2017 (the "Bill") which introduces the two-tiered profits tax rates regime. The Bill was signed into law on 28 March 2018 and was gazetted on the following day. Under the two-tiered profits tax rates regime, the first HK\$2 million of profits of the qualifying group entity will be taxed at 8.25%, and profits above HK\$2 million will be taxed at 16.5%. The profits of group entities not qualifying for the two-tiered profits tax rates regime will continue to be taxed at a flat rate of 16.5%.

The directors of the Company considered the amount involved upon implementation of the two-tiered profits tax rates regime is insignificant to the consolidated financial statements. Hong Kong Profits Tax is calculated at 16.5% of the estimated assessable profit for both years.

Under the Law of the Mainland China on Enterprise Income Tax (the "EIT Law") and Implementation Regulation of the EIT Law, the tax rate of the Mainland China subsidiaries is 25% from 1 January 2008 onwards, except for High Fashion Silk (Zhejiang) Co., Ltd. ("High Fashion Silk") and High Fashion (China) Co., Ltd. ("High Fashion China"), which have been recognised as an advanced technology enterprise by the Mainland China Tax Bureau in 2021. High Fashion Silk and High Fashion China are subject to an income tax rate of 15% for three years starting from the year being recognised as an advanced technology enterprise in Hangzhou.

For both years, the Group leases various offices premises, retail stores, factories and warehouses for its operations. Lease contracts are entered into for fixed term of 12 months to 10 years (2020: 12 months to 10 years), but may have termination options as described below. Lease terms are negotiated on an individual basis and contain a wide range of different terms and conditions. In determining the lease term and assessing the length of the noncancellable period, the Group applies the definition of a contract and determines the period for which the contract is enforceable.

In addition, the Group owns several industrial buildings where its manufacturing facilities are primarily located and office buildings. The Group is the registered owner of these property interests, including the underlying leasehold lands. Lump sum payments were made upfront to acquire these property interests. The leasehold land components of these owned properties are presented separately only if the payments made can be allocated reliably.

The Group regularly entered into short-term leases for retail stores. As at 31 December 2021 and 2020, the portfolio of short-term leases is similar to the portfolio of short-term leases to which the short-term lease expenses disclosed above.

The overall financial effect of using variable payment terms is that higher rental costs are incurred by stores with higher sales. Variable rent expenses are expected to continue to represent a similar proportion of store sales in future years.

For the completed investment properties, the valuations were arrived at by making reference to market evidence of transaction prices for similar properties in similar locations and conditions or on the basis of capitalisation of net income with due allowance for the reversionary income and redevelopment potential. The net income is the market rentals of all lettable units of the properties and discounted at the market yield expected by investors for this type of properties. The market rentals are assessed by making reference to the rentals achieved in the lettable units of the properties as well as other lettings of similar properties in the neighbourhood. The discount rate is determined by making reference to the yields derived from analysing the sales transactions of similar properties in the relevant locations and adjusted to take into account the market expectation from property investors to reflect factors specific to the Group's investment properties.

For investment properties held for development/under construction, the valuations were arrived at by direct comparison with comparable properties as available in the market with due allowance for development costs and indirect cost that will be expended to complete the development of the properties, as well as developer's risks associated with the development at the valuation date and the return that the developer would require for bringing the properties to the completion status, which is determined by the valuers on the analysis of recent land transactions and the market value of similar completed properties in the relevant locations.

In estimating the fair value of the completed properties, the highest and best use of the properties is their current use. In estimating the fair value of investment properties held for development/under construction, management of the Group has taken into account the highest and best use of the properties from the perspective of market participants, taking into account the future development potential of the properties.

The Group's investment properties are categorised into level 3 of the fair value hierarchy. At the end of each reporting period, the Group Finance Director ("GFD") works closely with the independent qualified professional valuers to establish and determine the appropriate valuation techniques and inputs to be used in determining the fair value of the investment properties. Deferred tax liabilities have not been provided for in the consolidated financial statements in respect of the temporary differences attributable to the profits earned by subsidiaries in the Mainland China amounting to HK\$1,033,067,000 (2020: HK\$1,010,960,000) as the Group is able to control the timing of the reversal of the temporary differences and it is probable that the temporary differences will not be reversed in the foreseeable future.

The Group has estimated unused tax losses of HK\$649.549.000 (2020; HK\$692.692.000) available for offsetting against future taxable profits of the companies in which the losses arose. A deferred tax asset has been recognised in respect of HK\$284,563,000 (2020: HK\$353,824,000) of the temporary differences, while no deferred tax asset has been recognised in respect of the remaining temporary differences of HK\$364,986,000 (2020: HK\$338,868,000) due to unpredictability of future profit streams. Under (a) the contract, the beneficiary and contract holder is High Fashion Garments Management Limited ("HFGML"), a wholly owned subsidiary of the Company, and the total insured sum is approximately United States Dollar ("US\$") 10,000,000 (equivalent to HK\$77,500,000). HFGML paid a gross premium of US\$3,582,000 (equivalent to HK\$27,763,000), including a premium charge at inception of the contract amounting to US\$215,000 (equivalent to HK\$1,666,000). HFGML may request a partial surrender or full surrender of the contract at any time and receive cash based on the cash value of the contract at the date of withdrawal, which is determined by the gross premium paid plus accumulated guaranteed income earned and minus insurance premium charged at inception. In June 2016, a judgment was made by the Intermediate People's Court Shaoxing Zhejiang Province (the "Judgment") which stated that the Group had convicted an offence of illicit transportation of common goods or articles without paying customs duty and was required to pay a penalty of approximately RMB28,000,000 and unpaid customs of approximately RMB27,000,000, out of which the RMB30,000,000 deposit previously paid would be confiscated by the customs authority and used to offset the amount payable. In July 2016, the Group appealed against the Judgment (the "Appeal") to the Higher People's Court of Zhejiang Province.

After the legal proceedings in 2017 and 2018, management of the Group had sought advice from legal professionals in the Mainland China, who advised that the evidence relied upon by the court is not factually supported, against which the Group has strong grounds to refute. Nevertheless, the Group may still be subject to a penalty for not complying the processing trade requirement, which is estimated to be approximately RMB2,000,000 (equivalent to HK\$2,445,000) (2020: RMB2,000,000 (equivalent to HK\$2,371,000). The Group has made a provision for penalty for the same amount accordingly since 2018.

In May 2019, a court hearing was held by the Higher People's Court of Zhejiang Province to hear the defense opinion from the Group. In July 2019, the Zhejiang People's Procuratorate (浙江省人民檢察院) visited the Group's office in Hangzhou and performed various verification of defense evidence. According to the external lawyer in the Mainland China, the verification process is a common judicial practice in the Mainland China and it implies a favourable outlook to the Group. As at 31 December 2021, the Group has not yet received the judgment from the court and the external lawyer remains the same view.

Based on the latest external legal advice, the final ruling of the court will not be probable in the next twelve months from the end of the reporting period, and therefore, the deposit and provision have been presented as a non-current asset and a non-current liability (2020: a current asset and a current liability), respectively, in the consolidated statement of financial position.

In addition, any share options to a substantial shareholder of the Company and/or an independent non-executive director of the Company or any of their respective associates that would result in the total number of shares issued and to be issued upon exercise of all options granted or to be granted to such person in any 12-month period exceeding 0.1% of the shares in issue and with an aggregate value (based on the price of the shares on the date of grant) in excess of HK\$5 million is subject to shareholders' approval in a general meeting.

No consideration is payable by the grantee in respect of the acceptance of the offer of grant of the option. The exercise period of the share options granted is determinable by the directors of the Company, but no later than 10 years from the date of the offer. The minimum period for which an option must be held before it can be exercised is to be determined by the directors of the Company after having regard to the particular circumstances of each grantee.

50% of the options granted were exercisable from 3 December 2019 to 2 December 2028, while the remaining 50% of the options granted were exercisable from 3 December 2020 to 2 December 2028. Deposits and other receivables mainly represent refund and claims receivables and utility deposits. The directors of the Company consider that there is no material credit risk inherent with the outstanding balance of deposits and other receivables after individual assessment on the recoverability of these balances based on historical settlement records, past experience, and also available reasonable and supportive forward-looking information.

The directors of the Company consider that the risk of default by the counterparties is low taking into account the historical settlement records and the financial position of the joint ventures except for the amount due from Longford. At 31 December 2021 and 2020, the Group considered the prospect of recovery the amount due from Longford is remote due to the legal dispute and determined that a full impairment of HK\$17,086,000 was recognised.

#### Short-term deposits and bank balances

The Group's short-term deposits and bank balances are placed with banks of high credit ratings. The directors of the Company assessed the credit risk by reference to information relating to probability of default and loss given default of the respective external credit rating grades published by external credit rating agencies and concluded the risk of default by counterparties is low.

The credit risk on bank balances and short-term bank deposits is limited because the counterparties are banks with high credit rating ranging from Baa1 to Aa3 assigned by international credit-rating agencies. The Group performed an impairment assessment at 12m ECL by reference to information published by external credit rating agencies relating to probability of default and loss given default of the respective credit rating grades, and concluded that the risks of default of these counterparties are low. Accordingly, no impairment loss has been recognised as amount involved is insignificant.

#### Liquidity risk

In the management of the liquidity risk, the Group monitors and maintains a level of cash and cash equivalents deemed adequate by management of the Group to finance the Group's operations and mitigate the effects of fluctuations in cash flows. Management of the Group monitors the utilisation of bank borrowings and ensures compliance with loan covenants.

The following table details the Group's remaining contractual maturity for its financial liabilities and derivative financial instruments. The table has been drawn up based on the undiscounted cash flows of financial liabilities based on the earliest date on which the Group can be required to pay. Specifically, bank borrowings with a repayment on demand clause are included in the earliest time band regardless of the probability of the banks which choose to exercise their rights. The maturity dates for other non-derivative financial liabilities are based on the agreed repayment dates.

While the Hong Kong Dollar Overnight Index Average ("HONIA") has been identified as an alternative to HIBOR, there is no plan to discontinue HIBOR. The multi-rate approach has been adopted in Hong Kong, whereby HIBOR and HONIA will co-exist.

#### Risks arising from the interest rate benchmark reform

The following are the key risks for the Group arising from the transition:

#### Interest rate related risks

For contracts which have not been transitioned to the relevant alternative benchmark rates and without detailed fallback clauses, if the bilateral negotiations with the Group's counterparties are not successfully concluded, there are significant uncertainties with regard to the interest rate that would apply. This gives rise to additional interest rate risk that was not anticipated when the contracts were entered into.

The additional uncertainty on various alternative rates which are typically published on overnight basis will require additional liquidity management. The Group's liquidity risk management policy has been updated to ensure sufficient liquid resources to accommodate unexpected increases in overnight rates.

#### Litigation risk

If no agreement is reached to implement the interest rate benchmark reform on contracts which have not been transitioned to the relevant alternative benchmark rates (e.g. arising from differing interpretation of existing fallback terms), there is a risk of prolonged disputes with counterparties which could give rise to additional legal and other costs. The Group is working closely with all counterparties to avoid this from occurring.

#### Interest rate basis risk

Interest rate basis risk may arise if a non-derivative instrument and the derivative instrument held to manage the interest risk on the non-derivative instrument transition to alternative benchmark rates at different times. This risk may also arise where back-to-back derivatives transition at different times. The Group will monitor this risk against its risk management policy which has been updated to allow for temporary mismatches of up to 12 months and transact additional basis interest rate swaps if required.

#### (ii) Progress towards implementation of alternative benchmark interest rates

As part of the Group's risk management for transition, new contracts to be entered into by the Group will link to the relevant alternative benchmark rates or interest rates which are not subject to reform to the extent feasible. Otherwise, the Group will ensure the relevant contracts including detailed fallback clauses clearly referencing the alternative benchmark rate and the specific triggering event on which the clause is activated.

As at 31 December 2021, the Group had an interest rate swap contract linked to HIBOR with an carrying amount of HK\$1,989,000. Under the interest rate swap contract, the Group swaps HIBOR interest rate for a fixed interest rate. As such, the Group considered that such impact on the Group has been partially mitigated.

Besides, as at 31 December 2021, the Group had bank borrowings of HK\$1,677,079,000 linked to HIBOR and is negotiating with banks to continue HIBOR to maturity.

## 45. RETIREMENT BENEFITS SCHEMES

The Group participates in the Mandatory Provident Fund Schemes (the "MPF Schemes") for all qualifying employees of the Group in Hong Kong. The Group follows the minimum contribution requirement of 5% of eligible employees' relevant aggregated income with a cap of HK\$1,500 per month. The assets of the MPF Schemes are held separately from those of the Group, in funds under the control of the trustees. The employees of the subsidiaries in the Mainland China are members of retirement benefits schemes operated by the Chinese government. The contributions are charged to the profit or loss as incurred. The relevant subsidiaries in the Mainland China are required to make contributions to the state retirement schemes in the Mainland China based on a certain percentage of the monthly salaries of their current employees to fund the benefits. The employees are entitled to retirement pension calculated with reference to their basic salaries on retirement and their length of service in accordance with the relevant government regulations. The Chinese government is responsible for the pension liability to these retired staff.
