NOTES TO THE UNAUDITED CONDENSED CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

The Company is an exempted company with limited liability incorporated in the Cayman Islands on 22 May 2017. The registered office of the Company is situated at PO Box 1350, Windward 3, Regatta Office Park, Grand Cayman KY1-1108, Cayman Islands. The principal place of business in Hong Kong under Part 16 of the Companies Ordinance (Cap. 622 of the laws of Hong Kong) is at Room 3705, 37/F, Hong Kong Plaza, 188 Connaught Road West, Hong Kong.

The Company's Shares were listed on GEM of the Stock Exchange on 9 May 2018.

The Company is an investment holding company. The Company's subsidiaries are principally engaged in the business of:

- (1) dining operations in Singapore; and
- (2) artisanal bakery chains in Malaysia.

2. BASIS OF PRESENTATION

The unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRSs"), which include all international Financial Reporting Standards, International Accounting Standards ("IASs") and interpretations issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (the "IASB"), and the disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in Hong Kong and the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance.

The unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements are presented in Singapore dollar ("SGD" or "S\$") and all values in the tables are rounded to the nearest thousand ("S\$'000"), except when otherwise indicated.

The basis of preparation and accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements for the three months ended 31 March 2022 are consistent with those adopted in the preparation of the Group's consolidated financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2021 included in the 2021 Annual Report.

The Group has not adopted the new and revised IFRSs, which have been issued but are not yet effective.



Basis of consolidation

The unaudited condensed consolidated financial statements include the financial statements of the Group for the three months ended 31 March 2022. A subsidiary is an entity (including a structured entity), directly or indirectly, controlled by the Company. Control is achieved when the Group is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the investee (i.e., existing rights that give the Group the current ability to direct the relevant activities of the investee).

When the Company has, directly or indirectly, less than a majority of the voting or similar rights of an investee, the Group considers all relevant facts and circumstances in assessing whether it has power over an investee, including:

- (a) the contractual arrangement with the other vote holders of the investee;
- (b) rights arising from other contractual arrangements; and
- (c) the Group's voting rights and potential voting rights.

The financial statements of the subsidiaries are prepared for the same reporting period as the Company, using consistent accounting policies. The results of subsidiaries are consolidated from the date on which the Group obtains control, and continue to be consolidated until the date that such control ceases.

Profit or loss and each component of other comprehensive income are attributed to the owners of the parent of the Group. All intra-group income and expenses relating to transactions between members of the Group are eliminated in full on consolidation.

The Group reassesses whether or not it controls an investee if facts and circumstances indicate that there are changes to one or more of the three elements of control described above. A change in the ownership interest of a subsidiary, without a loss of control, is accounted for as an equity transaction.

If the Group loses control over a subsidiary, it derecognises (i) the assets (including goodwill) and liabilities of the subsidiary, (ii) the carrying amount of any non-controlling interest and (iii) the cumulative translation differences recorded in equity; and recognises (i) the fair value of the consideration received, (ii) the fair value of any investment retained and (iii) any resulting surplus or deficit in profit or loss. The Group's share of components previously recognised in other comprehensive income is reclassified to profit or loss or retained profits, as appropriate, or the same basis as would be required if the Group had directly disposed of the related assets or liabilities.



3. REVENUE, OTHER INCOME AND GAINS

Revenue represents the amounts received and receivable from the Group's operation and management of restaurants and bakery retail outlets, net of discounts. An analysis of the Group's revenue, other income and gains is as follows:

Subsidiaries in Singapore and Malaysia are subject to taxation at rates of 17% and 24% on the estimated profits arising in Singapore and Malaysia, respectively for the three months ended 31 March 2022 and 2021.

The Group had no potentially dilutive ordinary share in issue for the three months ended 31 March 2022 and 2021.

7. EVENTS AFTER THE END OF THE REPORTING PERIOD

The Company was served with a writ of summons dated 23 February 2021 issued from the Supreme Court of Singapore by View Advance Limited against the Company and Ms. Low Yeun Ching@Kelly Tan ("**Ms. Low**"), the chairlady of the Board and the executive Director, claiming for a total sum of S\$9,073,811 (the "**Claim**"). On 4 April 2022, the Company has received an order of court dated 28 March 2022 issued from the Singapore Court that (i) the Claim be struck out in its entirety; and (ii) View Advance Limited (as the plaintiff) is to pay the Company and Ms. Low (as the defendants) costs for the application and defending the Claim. For details, please refer to the announcements of the Company dated 15 March 2021, 1 November 2021 and 6 April 2022.

Save for the above, there were no important events affecting the Group that have occurred after the end of the reporting period and up to the date of this report.



MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

BUSINESS REVIEW

We are a food and beverage group which owns and operates award-winning restaurants in Singapore under different brands and owns one of the largest artisanal bakery chains in Malaysia in terms of revenue and the number of bakery retail outlets in Malaysia. We operate our dining operations in Singapore under two self-owned brands and one franchised brand. Our “Central Hong Kong Café” brand is primarily focused on offering a casual and authentic Cha Chaan Teng experience in a full service environment while our “Black Society” brand offers Chinese cuisines with a contemporary twist in a full service environment. The franchised “Greyhound Café” brand provides stylish and trendy ambience which serves a specialised Thai menu with creative twists. Our artisanal bakery chain in Malaysia offers a wide selection of artisan breads, pastries and cakes under the “Bread Story” brand.

We believe that our Group is competitively positioned based on our operating history of more than ten years, our strong brand recognition and reputation, diversified customer base, innovative product offerings, unique dining experience and experienced management. In addition, the locations of our restaurants in Singapore and our bakery retail outlets in Malaysia are vital to our Group’s strategy of targeting areas which are high in customer traffic and easily accessible by our target customers that will help in promoting our brands image and awareness.

OUTLOOK

The Company’s shares (the “**Shares**”) were successfully listed on GEM of the Stock Exchange on 9 May 2018 (the “**Listing Date**”) by way of share offer of a total of 125,000,000 Shares, at the offer price of HK\$0.50 per Share (the “**Share Offer**”). The amount of the net proceeds from the Share Offer received by the Company was approximately HK\$23.7 million.

The Directors believe that the listing of the Company on GEM of the Stock Exchange (the “**Listing**”) would facilitate the implementation of our business plans to capture more market share in the industry. The Listing would (i) strengthen our Group’s corporate profile; (ii) provide a fund-raising platform for our Group; and (iii) diversify our shareholder base.

The current business environment is pretty much the same as what was mentioned in our Annual Report 2021. However there is something noteworthy which is the rising tax policy amidst inflationary pressures both in America and Singapore, this is something we have to closely monitor on the macro front as rising taxes and inflation can affect consumption patterns.

Now that we can see a global concerted effort to open up borders (except China) and many European countries as well as the US have eased up all pandemic safety and control measures, Singapore is not lacking behind and we are seeing an almost back to pre-pandemic days albeit tourist numbers are picking up gradually.

As such, we expect economic activities to gradually normalize but we are also monitoring on the rising material costs due to a strain on the global supply chain which is unfortunately on-going. This is on top of the severe labour challenges and shortage in Singapore which is pushing up wage levels to new high and will remain a constant strain on operating margins.

Our newly opened café Q Classified in Ngee Ann City is doing favourably, while our announced business prospect in China is being put on hold due to the zero-covid policy China has adopted where lock-downs and strict restrictions on internal movements are applied across the country, especially with the recent much publicized Shanghai predicament of a cosmopolitan city.



In contrast to the situation in China, like what most pundits are predicting that this covid-19 pandemic may end in 2022 due largely to rising global vaccination rates and development of antiviral covid pills, Singapore has already transitioned to the new endemic normal as of 26 April 2022. Together with all global traveling restrictions ending, we hope to see a rapid recovery in economic activities where retail will certainly dominate the frontline.

The Directors will continue to adopt a cautious and prudent approach in adjusting its business strategy with the aim to minimise loss and improve the performance of the Group. Striving ahead, the Group remains committed towards all stakeholders and safeguarding the interest of every shareholder who takes confidence and faith in us remains our key motto.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Revenue

Our revenue decreased by approximately S\$0.19 million or 4.7% from approximately S\$4.12 million for the three months ended 31 March 2021 to S\$3.93 million for the three months ended 31 March 2022. The decrease in our revenue was due to dine-in restrictions on limiting dining group size (5 pax dine-in cap) since January 2022 and throughout the Chinese New Year period in response to the surge of Omicron cases imposed by the Singapore government.

Cost of inventories sold and consumed

Despite a decrease in revenue, our cost of inventories sold and consumed had increased by approximately S\$0.06 million or 5.7% from approximately S\$1.01 million for the three months ended 31 March 2021 to approximately S\$1.07 million for the three months ended 31 March 2022. The rising in food costs was mainly due to overall ingredient prices inflation.

Other income

Our other income decreased by approximately S\$0.33 million or 69.7% from approximately S\$0.47 million for the three months ended 31 March 2021 to approximately S\$0.14 million for the three months ended 31 March 2022. The decrease was primarily due to lesser grants and rent concessions offered by the local governments and landlords respectively, in response to the impact brought by the COVID-19 pandemic, as the government and landlords gradually tapered the level of grants provided to the F&B sector since early 2021.

Depreciation of right-of-use assets

Depreciation of right-of-use assets decreased by approximately S\$0.31 million or 30.2% from approximately S\$1.01 million for the period ended 31 March 2021 to approximately S\$0.70 million for the three months ended 31 March 2022. The decrease is due to lesser operating outlets as compared to prior year and one outlet was renewed as short term lease upon lease renewal.



Other expenses

Other expenses primarily consist of legal and professional fees, rental and related expenses, cleaning fee, repair and maintenance expenses, kitchen and bar utensils expenses, bank charges relating to credit card settlement, unrealised foreign currency exchange losses and other miscellaneous expenses. Our other expenses had decreased by S\$0.24 million or 25.5% from approximately S\$0.93 million for the three months ended 31 March 2021 to approximately S\$0.69 million for the three months ended 31 March 2022. The decrease was mainly due to lesser operating outlets and absent of non-recurring course fee incurred for a key management in prior year.

Loss for the period

Our Group recorded a loss of approximately S\$0.48 million and S\$0.45 million for the three months ended 31 March 2022 and 2021, respectively. The increase in losses for the three months ended 31 March 2022 was mainly attributable to the overall decrease in revenue due to the dine-in restrictions as well as the decrease in grants and rent concessions received from the local government and landlords, respectively.

The Company conditionally adopted a share option scheme on 4 April 2018 (the "**Scheme**"). The terms of the Scheme are in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 23 of the GEM Listing Rules. No share option has been granted since the adoption of the Scheme up to 31 March 2022.

The Company is committed to achieving high standards of corporate governance. The Directors believe that sound and reasonable corporate governance practices are essential for the continuing growth of the Group and for safeguarding and maximising shareholders' interests.

Pursuant to code provision A.2 of the Corporate Governance Code contained in Appendix 15 to the GEM Listing Rules (the "**CG Code**"), the roles of chairman and chief executive officer should be separate and should not be performed by the same individual. However, we do not have a separate chairlady and chief executive officer and Ms. Low currently performs these two roles. Our Board believes that vesting the roles of both chairlady and chief executive officer in the same person has the benefit of ensuring consistent leadership within our Group and enables more effective and efficient overall strategic planning of our Group. Our Board considers that the balance of power and authority for the present arrangement will not be impaired and this structure will enable our Company to make and implement decisions promptly and effectively. Our Board will continue to review and consider splitting the roles of chairlady of our Board and chief executive officer of our Company at a time when it is appropriate and suitable by taking into account the circumstances of our Group as a whole.

Save as disclosed above, the Directors consider that during the three months ended 31 March 2022 and up to the date of this report, the Company has applied the principles and complied with all the applicable code provisions set out in the CG Code.



DIRECTORS' AND CONTROLLING SHAREHOLDERS' INTERESTS IN COMPETING BUSINESSES

Save as disclosed in the Prospectus, as at 31 March 2022, each of the Directors, the Controlling Shareholder and their respective close associates (as defined in the GEM Listing Rules) has confirmed that none of them had an interest in a business (other than those businesses where the Director were appointed as directors to represent the interests of the Company and/or any member of the Group) which are considered to compete or are likely to compete, either directly or indirectly, with the business of the Group.

AUDIT COMMITTEE

Pursuant to Rule 5.28 of the GEM Listing Rules, the Company established an audit committee (the "**Audit Committee**") with written terms of reference aligned with the provision of the code provisions set out in the CG Code. The primary duties of the Audit Committee are to review and supervise the financial reporting process and internal control procedures of the Group. As at 31 March 2022, the Audit Committee comprises Mr. Lu King Seng (chairman of the Audit Committee), Mr. John Chi Chung Man and Mr. Chan Pak Hung, all of whom are independent non-executive Directors. The Audit Committee has reviewed the unaudited first quarterly results report of the Group for the three months ended 31 March 2022. A meeting of the Audit Committee was held with the management of the Company for, amongst other things, reviewing the unaudited first quarterly results report of the Group for the three months ended 31 March 2022.

DIVIDENDS

The Board did not recommend the payment of any interim dividend for the three months ended 31 March 2022 (three month ended 31 March 2021: Nil).

SIGNIFICANT INVESTMENTS, MATERIAL ACQUISITION AND DISPOSAL

The Group did not have any significant investments, material acquisition or disposal of subsidiaries or associates during the three months ended 31 March 2022.
